The SHRA was established in terms of the Social Housing Act, No. 16 of 2008.

SHRA is based in Johannesburg.

SHRA regulates the social housing sector and invests in social housing projects.

The sector which the SHRA regulates consists of:

- Social Housing Institutions (SHIs) which are non-profit companies and act as Landlords in terms of the Rental Housing Act
- A few SHIs are Municipal Owned Entities (MoEs)
- Other delivery agents may also develop social housing projects
- Housing Co-Operatives






The Social Housing Act (2008) defines social housing as:

other delivery agents in approved projects in designated restructuring zones with the benefit of public funding as contemplated in this Act form which requires institutionalised management and which is provided by social housing institutions or A rental or cooperative housing option for low to medium income households at a level of scale and built

Social Housing residents earn between R1 500 - R7 500 a month




