



## WORKSHOP WITH PROVINCIAL MULTI-PARTY WOMEN'S CAUCUSES ON THE POST 2015 SADC PROTOCOL ON GENDER EQUALITY

## **BACKGROUND**

The SADC Protocol on Gender and Development was adopted at the SADC Heads of State Summit in August 2008, emerging out of the SADC Declaration on Gender and Development signed in 1997. The Protocol encompasses commitments made in all regional, global and continental instruments for achieving gender equality, enhances these instruments by addressing gaps and setting specific measurable targets where they do not already exist and advances gender equality by ensuring accountability by all SADC Member States. The SADC Protocol is therefore a critical instrument within the southern African region as it brings together all the existing commitments made to gender equality into one sub-regional instrument. These include the commitments made in the Convention for the Elimination of All Forms of Discrimination against Women (CEDAW), the Beijing Platform for Action (BPFA), the African Charter on Human and Peoples Rights and the Millennium Development Goals (MDGs). The protocol contains 28 substantive targets for achieving gender equality by 2015. Key provisions of the Protocol include:

- The establishment of Constitutional and legal rights to enshrine gender equality
- The equal representation of women in all areas of decision-making
- Equal access to quality education and training for women and men, as well as their retention at all levels of education
- The equal participation of women in economic policy formulation and implementation
- The implementation of measures to combat and eliminate all forms of gender based violence and trafficking and the provision of comprehensive care services for victims of gender based violence
- The adoption of policies and programmes that address the physical, emotional and social well-being of women
- The provision of adequate prevention, treatment care and support in relation to HIV and AIDS
- Equal representation of women in conflict resolution and peace building processes
- The mainstreaming of gender in all information, communication and media policies and laws

South Africa signed the Protocol in 2008 and ratified it in August 2011.

## INTRODUCTION

In July 2015 the Southern African Development Community Parliamentary Forum will host a meeting of the Regional Women's Caucus, and part of those deliberations will include discussions on the post 2015 SADC Protocol on Gender Equality. Countries will be expected to report on engagements with stakeholders on the revised goals and targets. Specifically, the report to the SADC PF must detail the following:

- 1. Overview of any consultations with relevant stakeholder national, provincially and locally on the proposed frameworks, targets and indicators for the post-2015 SADC Gender Protocol discussions.
- 2. Any information on our Parliament's collaboration with relevant institutions that track the implementation of the SADC Gender Protocol in the legislative sector specifically
- 3. Any work the committees of Parliament have done in terms of human trafficking, domestic violence and the economic empowerment of women.

The following proposal outlines a proposed workshop with provincial legislatures, through women's caucuses, and other stakeholders on the theme Post-2015 goals and targets of the SADC Protocol on Gender Equality.
