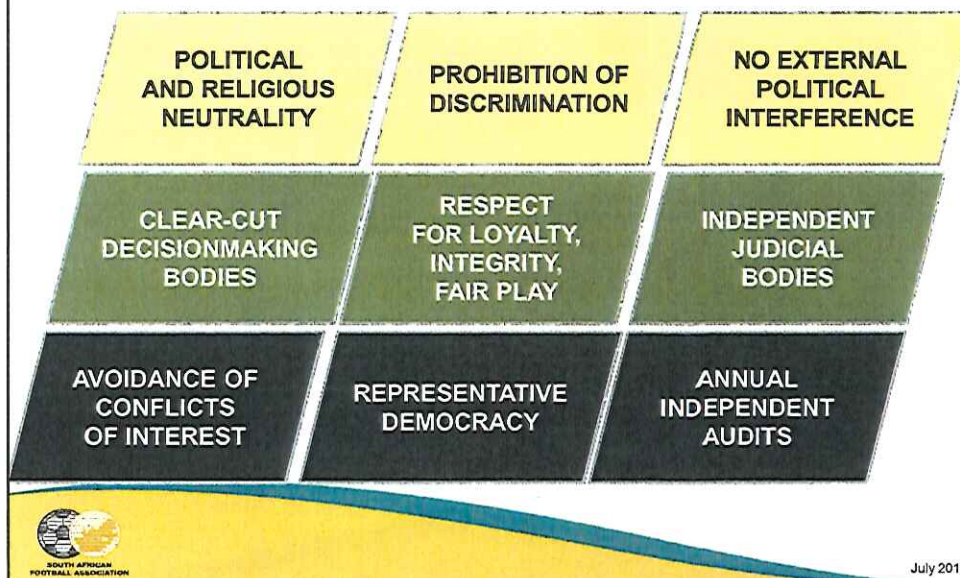

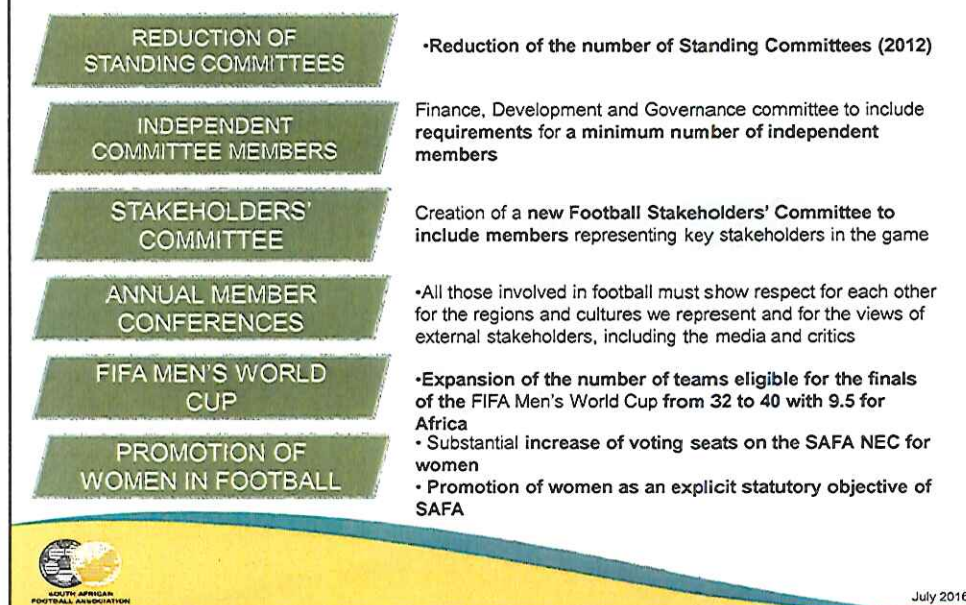

- Every NEC committee has at least one woman
- Four women in the SAFA NEC

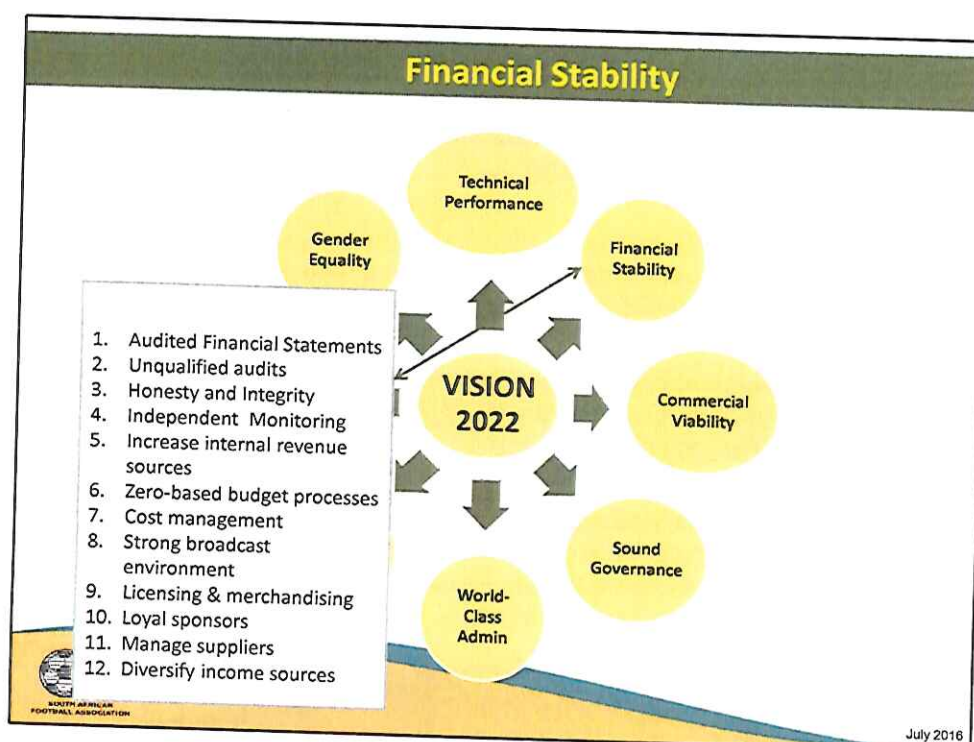
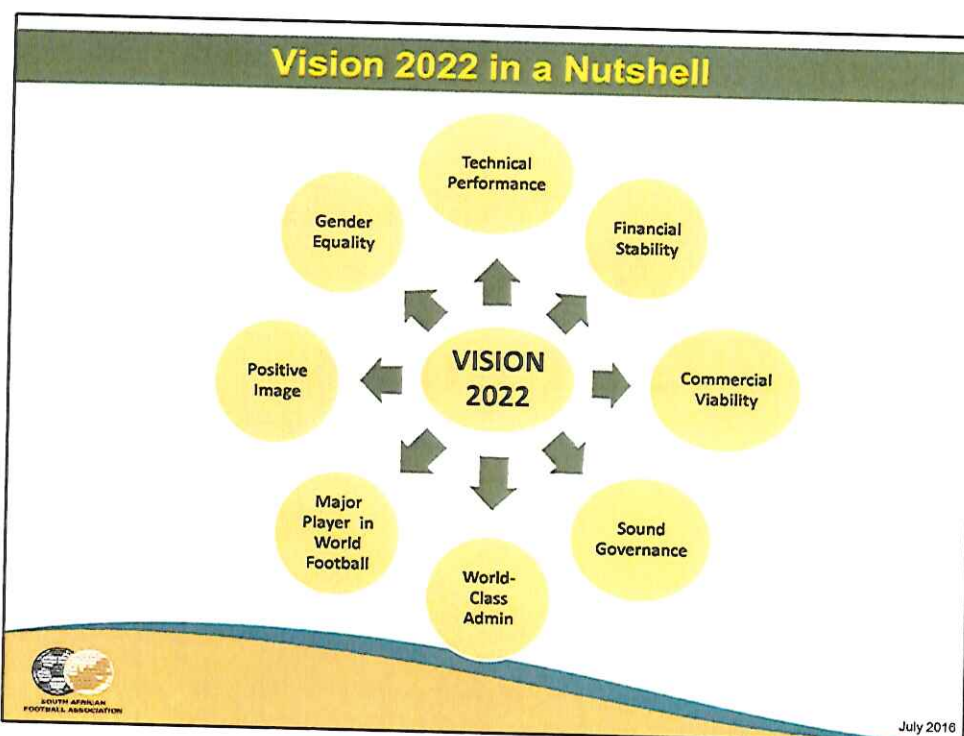
The goals of the new SAFA leadership have been defined and mapped out in a plan called **Vision 2022**

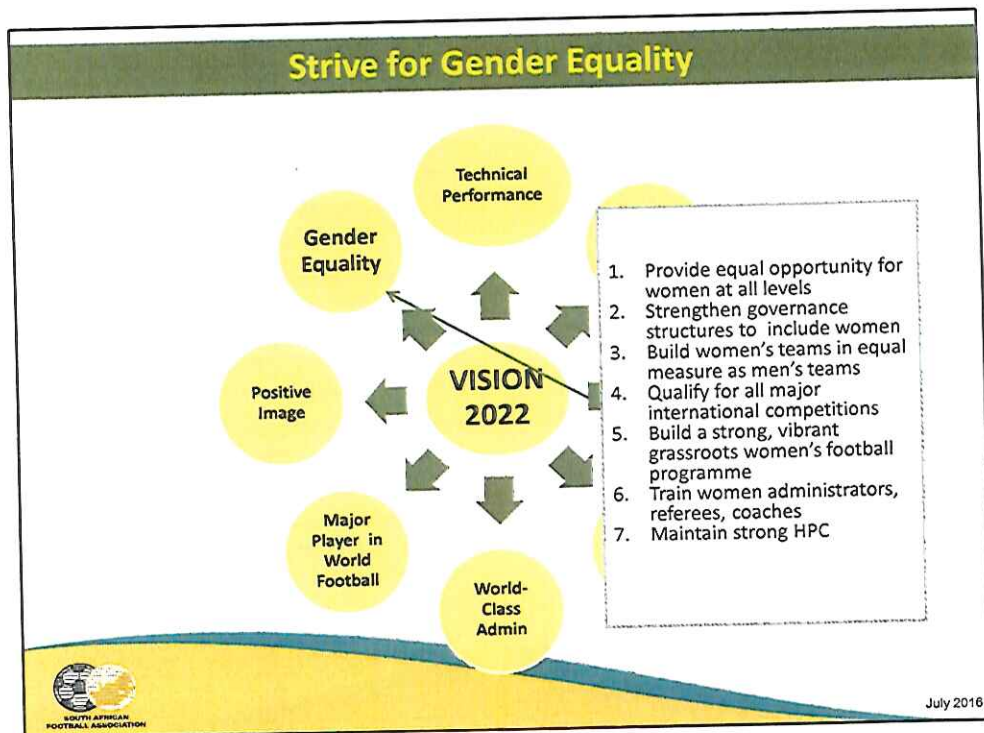
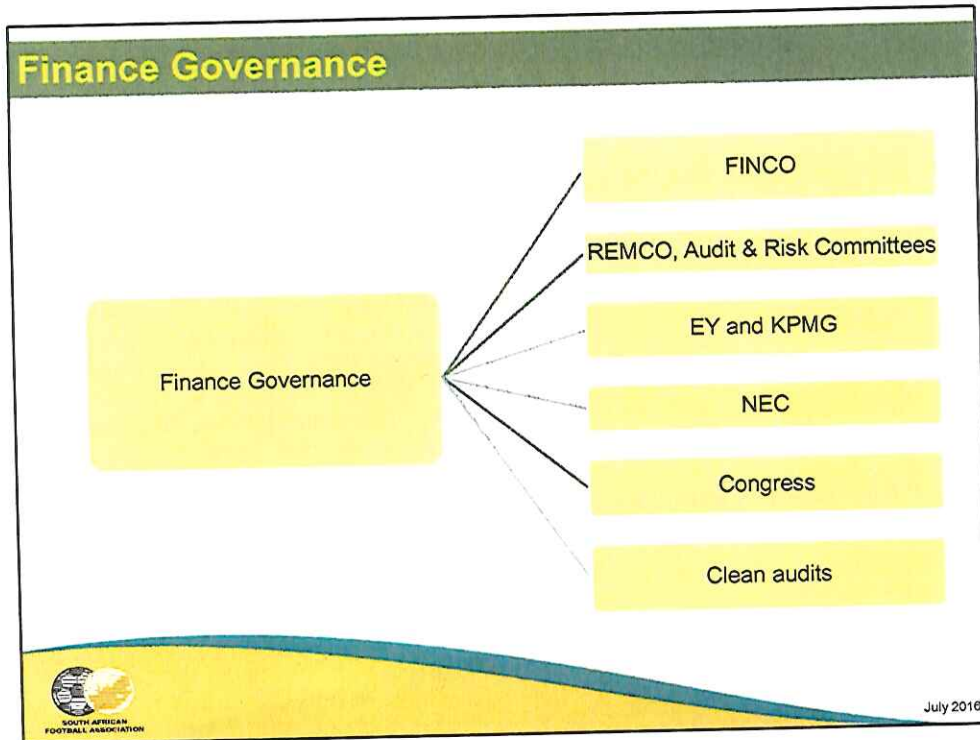
Vision 2022 is a fundamental rebuilding of the structures of SAFA at all levels to create the conditions that will bring about the sustained international success of our national teams

- We have set our sights on a long-term development plan to achieve the goal of always being in the top 3 of the African rankings, and in the top 20 of the World rankings
- 10% of the South African population must play football. Therefore, we need to redouble our efforts to:
 - Launch a vibrant schools football programme;
 - Strengthen women's football significantly.

Gender Scorecard

1. Provide equal opportunity for women at all levels

- We have staged coaching and administration courses for women;
- We now have 30 CAF "A" License women coaches;
- We plan to organise another women's administrators course this year

2. Strengthen governance structures to include women

- We have incorporated a requirement for the inclusion of women at all levels of football governance, requiring a minimum number of positions for women in executive committees, including vice-presidential roles in local and regional executive committees;

3. Build women's teams in equal measure as men's teams

We spent R26 million in 2016 preparing Banyana Banyana for the Rio Olympics and entered the U17 and U20 women's teams in international competitions

4. Qualify for all major international competitions

- Banyana Banyana qualified for the Rio Olympics in 2016
- Few U17 and U20 women's competitions for junior teams to participate in
- Zone 6 All Africa Games

5. Build a strong, vibrant grassroots women's football programme

- We have established the Live Your Goals Program to introduce girls to the sport;
- u13, u15, u17 leagues have been established in more than 200 Local Football Associations around the country

6. Train women administrators, referees, coaches

- We now have 7 women (out of a panel of 64 officials) who officiate at the highest level of the game (the PSL level)

7. Maintain strong HPC

- We spend approximately R4-5m per year on maintaining the women's programme at the HPC and employ 3 full-time staff at the Centre, in addition to the other support provided by the university

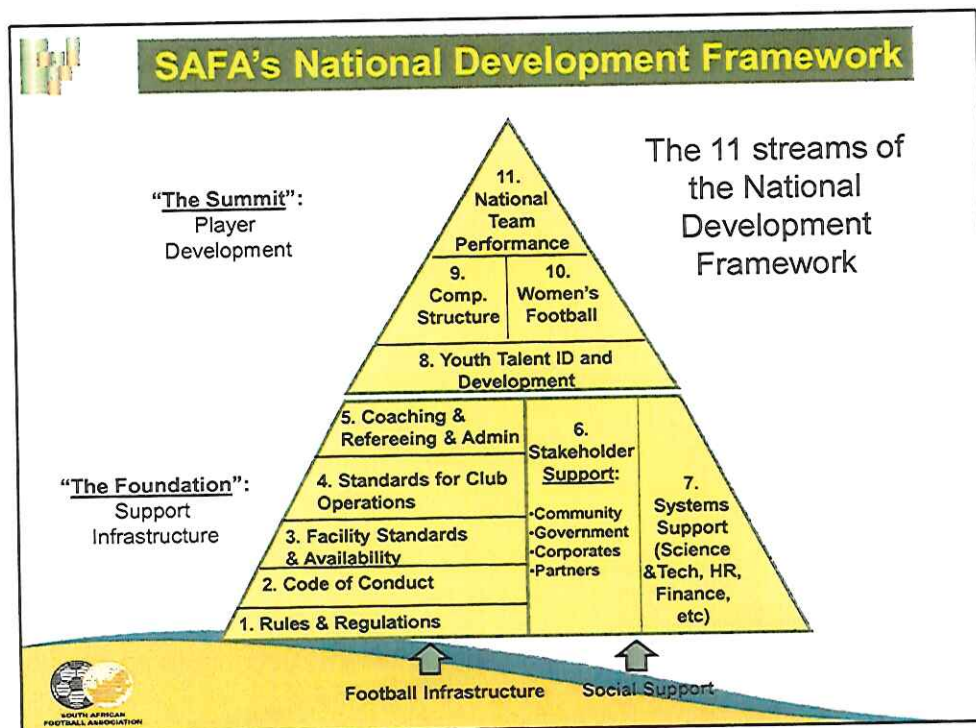

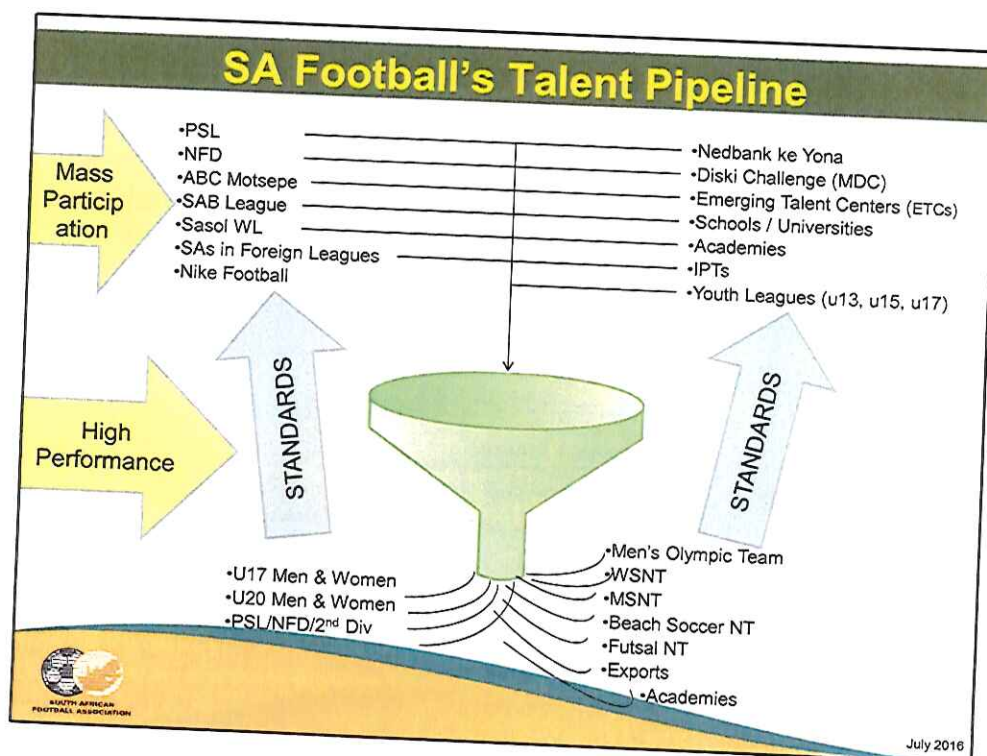

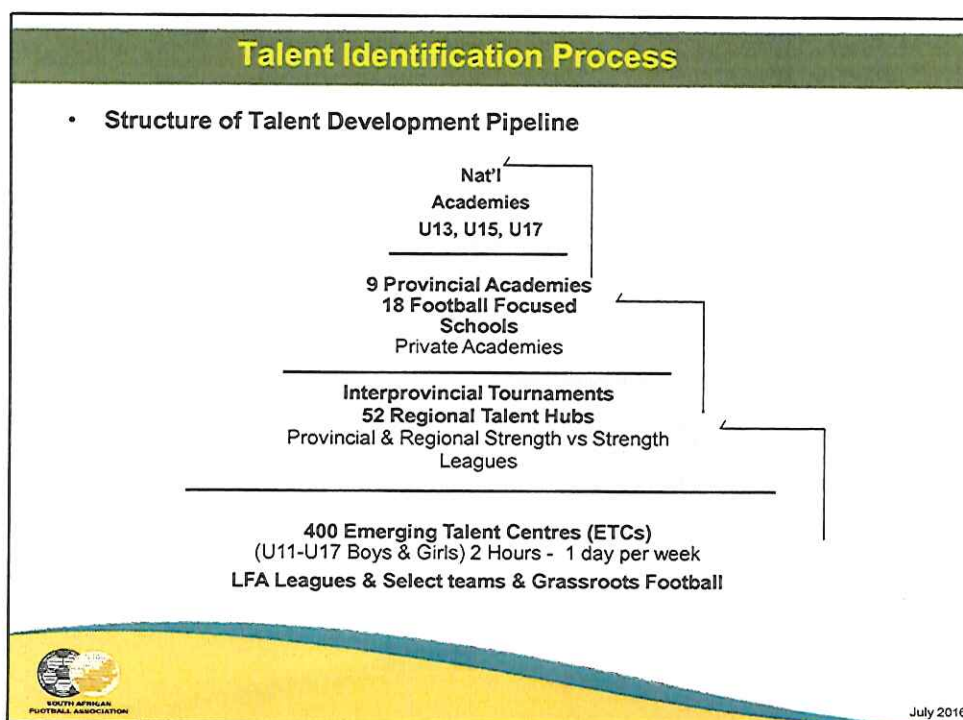

SCHOOLS SPORT

- Vision 2022 calls for growth of SAFA members to 5 million
- Participation of girls
- Schools football is a major area of growth
- Some former Model C schools still resist introduction of football
- Minister met the NEC on 19 December 2014 and called for partnership with SAFA
- He emphasised that SAFA as the biggest federation must take the lead in schools football
- He stated that SAFA will have to advise on the role and status of SASFA
- NEC established an Ad Hoc Committee to initiate the process
- Ad Hoc Committee made recommendations to NEC
- NEC and Congress of March 2015 passed the resolution



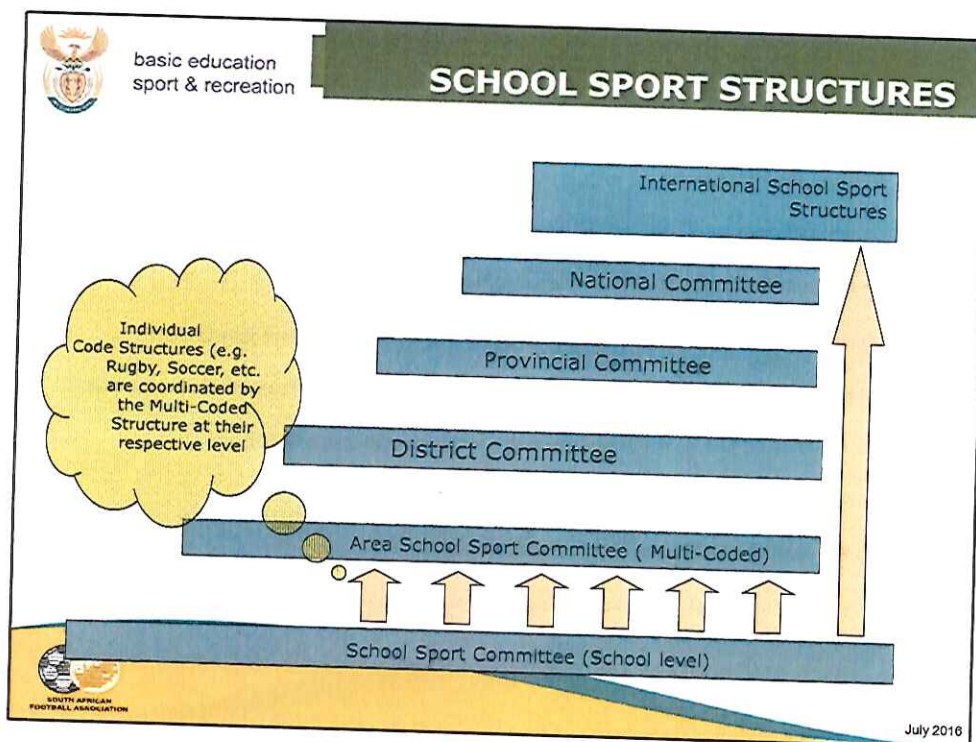
