2. LEARNER AND TEACHER SUPPORT MATERIAL (LTSM)

#### Advantages of LTSM central procurement system

The Eastern Cape Department of Education (ECDOE) does not participate in the mational LTSM Centralised Procurement System.

The ECDOE procures and manages delivery of LTSM for all schools in the province. However, Quintile 4 and 5 schools may opt out of the ECDOE Procurement System.

The advantages of the current ECDOE system is that the Department places orders with publishers and suppliers on behalf of schools, that is, the Department takes administrative responsibility for procuring LTSM.

- A second benefit is that the costs of LTSM are reduced because the Department benefits from economies of scale.
- Thirdly, the ECDOE arranges for the picking, packing and delivery of LTSM to schools through local SMMEs. Both schools and the local economy are beneficiaries



What happens to the budget that would be due to schools if their orders are less than their allocation

- Schools are allocated a paper budget every year for LTSM. 80% of a school's LTSM Budget is allocated to the procurement of stationery for every learner and 20% of the Budget is allocated for the procurement of 'top up' or replacement books.
- Schools are expected to ensure that every learner has sufficient stationery; a book for every subject and readers for the Home and First Additional Languages offered at the school.
- If the school has sufficient stationery and books, then they are expected to order other LTSM such as dictionaries, posters, charts, games etc. from a catalogue.



#### When to order LTSM

- In recent years, LTSM which was ordered by the ECDOE in August and September was delivered to schools in November of the year. Orders placed later than this were delivered in February to April of the following year.
- In 2018 the ECDOE will place orders in July 2018 to ensure all ordered LTSM is delivered to schools before schools close in December 2018. The best time to order is July of the year.



## The key challenges in the ECDOE procurement system

The key challenges are

- changes in learner enrolment from one year to the next;
- late ordering of LTSM by schools
- poor retention of LTSM.

The ECDOE has attempted to address these challenges through advocacy; letters to school principals and the distribution of a template for a School LTSM Management and Retention Policy. However, much work has to be done to ensure compliance by all schools.



#### Why do schools receive books they did not order

In the Eastern Cape there three possible reasons:

- Schools order the incorrect books or use the incorrect ISBN numbers
- The orders are captured incorrectly by the ECDOE LTSM
  Unit
- Mistakes are made in the picking and packing of books.

Although delivery of incorrect books is not a widespread occurrence in the Eastern Cape, the ECDOE will put further mechanisms in place to reduce these errors.



Role of District Offices in the monitoring and implementation of retrieval systems of LTSM.

- Each District in the ECDOE has two dedicated LTSM Coordinators. Their role is to ensure every school has a LTSM Management and Retrieval Policy and to monitor implementation.
- However, it is impossible for the 23 LTSM Co-ordinators to visit and monitor the 5 300 schools in the province.
- In 2018, the ECDOE has developed an online ordering and monitoring system to assist with the monitoring of LTSM procurement, delivery and retrieval.



#### The role of the ECDOE in the retention of LTSM

The role of the ECDOE has been to develop Guidelines for Management and Retention of LTSM and a template for schools for a Policy on LTSM Management and Retention.

This policy includes the following:

- The composition and responsibilities of School LTSM Committee
- Disposal of damaged or obsolete LTSM
- Advocacy of the care and control of all LTSM by learners, teachers and parents/care-givers
- Retention practices and policies
- The annual audit and take stock of LTSM at the end of the year
- The annual report on LTSM management to the SGB and the district office.





# 3. NATIONAL SCHOOL NUTRITION PROGRAM

#### Overview

#### PROGRAM PURPOSE:

- The NSNP promotes access to education to enhance learners' learning capacity through the provision of one nutritious meal on all school days to improve attainment of educational outcomes.
- This overarching purpose of the NSNP is integrally linked to the roll out of :
- al The Deworming of all Gr R -7 learners;
- b) Promotion of Nutrition Education activities towards the promotion of healthy lifestyles to all benefitting schools;
- Promotion of Food Production initiatives in schools through school food / wegetable gardens,
- d) Introduction of School Hygiene, for the first time 2018/19 towards the promotion of good and healthy habits, targeting grade 1 across all quintiles in the public ordinary schools. This new policy innovation necessitates readily available water supply to all benefitting schools
