## Independent Police Investigative Directorate (IPID) Amendment Bill

- 1. We act on behalf of the Council for the Advancement of the South African Constitution (CASAC).
- 2. CASAC is a non-governmental organization, functioning as a voluntary association. It is an initiative led by progressive people who seek to advance the South African Constitution as a platform for democratic politics and the transformation of society and who believe in the advancement of a society whose values are based on the core principles of the Constitution - the promotion of socio-economic rights, judicial independence and the rule of law, public accountability and open governance. It has undertaken research in the sphere of approaches to tackling the scourge of corruption, and has advocated the establishment of a dedicated, independent anti-corruption body with a triple mandate of investigation, prevention and public education.
- 3. CASAC was admitted as amicus curiae in the matter between McBride v Minister of Police and Another, in order advance legal argument on foreign law relating to Independent Civilian Oversight Bodies and to adduce evidence on the nature of the Independent Police Investigate Directorate and the importance of independence to its

legitimacy and functioning.

4. In that case, CASAC inter alia emphasised the importance of IPID's independence

structurally, functionally and in public perception. A copy of CASAC's written

submissions in that case is annexed for eased of reference.

5. CASAC welcomes the proposed amendments to the Independent Police Investigative

Directorate Act. In particularly the introduction of parliamentary oversight for the

removal or suspension of the Executive Director see para 53 of CASAC's written

submissions in McBride.

6. While the proposed amendments broadly align with CASAC's submissions in the

McBride matter, the amendment process provides a key opportunity to ensure that the

subsequent IPID Act not only caters for the McBride decision but puts IPID in the best

position to deal with future challenges.

7. In this regard CASAC would like to endorse the submissions made by the African

Policing Civilian Oversight Forum (APCOF) to Portfolio Committee on Police

regarding the draft Independent Police Investigative Directorate (IPID) Amendment Bill

which considers questions beyond the McBride decision.

8. We trust you find the above in order. Kindly acknowledge receipt of this
