PERFORMANCE INDICATORS AND TARGETS



- The **Basic Education Minister** delivered the Sector's Budget Vote for the 2019/20 financial year in Parliament on 16 July 2019.
 - For the 2019 Medium-Term Expenditure Framework (MTEF) period, the overall budget allocation for the DBE is above R24.5 billion, an increase of 3.4% from the 2018/19 overall allocation.
 - The **overall allocation** for 2019/20 Conditional Grants for the DBE is above **R18.6 billion**, an **increase of 4.9%** from the 2018/19 financial year.





- DBE's Director-General, led an ICT fact-finding mission to Kenya from 9 to 11 September 2019.
- National Book Week (NBW), launched during 2010, celebrated its tenth anniversary from 02 to 08 September 2019, under the theme: "A decade of Book Magic".
- Rwandan Director-General for Education Policy and Planning, and team received and welcomed Information and Communication Technology (ICT) experts from the DBE and Provincial Education Departments (PEDs) to Rwanda for an ICT fact-finding mission from 8 to 19 July 2019.





- 358 861 NSC and SC candidates wrote the examination on 2 May to 14 June 2019 with 23 956 candidates having enrolled for six (6) or more subjects.
 - Results for June NSC/SC 2019 were issued on 2 August 2019.
- Conducted a state of readiness support visit to all nine PEDs from 10 September - 1 October 2019
- LURITS Data uploads and verification of LURITS dataset against Provincial Warehouses datasets: As at 30 September 2019, the LURITS 2 system uploaded 12,029,553 learners from 24,989 schools.





- The National Association of Child Care Workers (NACCW) hosted the Global Child and Youth Care Conference in Durban from 02 - 04 July 2019.
 - -The Conference was held in tandem with the Child and Youth Care Network (CYC-Net) World Conference 2019, under the theme "Nation Building - One Child at a Time".

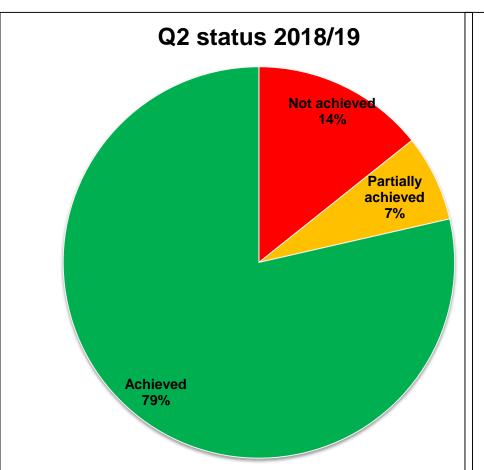

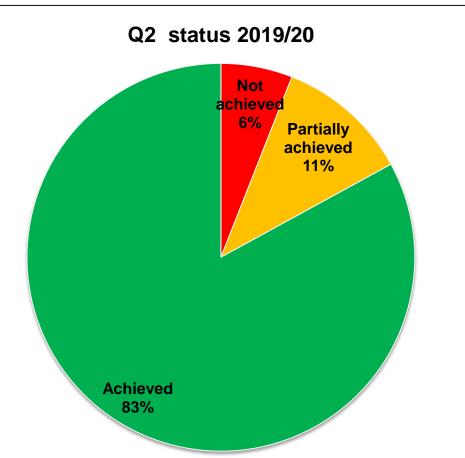

PROGRAMME 1: ADMINISTRATION

The purpose of Programme 1 is to manage the Department and provide strategic and administrative support services.



Corporate Services

- 14 posts were advertised. The SMS post of Directors: Social Cohesion and Equity in Education were filled.
- Interviews for the following SMS posts were held and recommendations were sent for approval.
 - Director: Inclusive Education, QLTC, Health promotion, Strategic Planning and Reporting, MST and Business and Parliamentary Processes





Training and Social Responsibility

- 55 employees attended skills development training in 5 programmes ranging from sign language to policy development.
- The Employee Health and Wellness and Financial Management Campaigns were organised on 11- 12 September 2019 and 415 officials participated.
- The following National Campaign was organised:
 - International Nelson Mandela Day DBE officials offered their
 67 Minutes for Madiba during Mandela Month on 18 July 2019.
- Other activities and celebrations for the quarter were as follows:
 - Women's day was celebrated on 23 August 2019.
 - Women's dialogue was conducted on 14 August 2019.
 - Heritage Day and Secretary's Day were celebrated on 27 September 2019.





Labour Relations

- Two (2) Condonation Rulings were received-employees requested permission of the CCMA for the late referral of their disputes. Both rulings were in favour of the Department. The matters were at Conciliation and Arbitration at the General Public Service Sectoral Bargaining Council (GPSSBC).
- One (1) formal grievance regarding unfair labour practice and alleged failure by the Department to implement a court order was received from one SMS member who was once dismissed and later retrospectively reinstated. A response regarding the grievance was compiled and issued to the employee within 30 days.





Government Information Technology Officer (GITO)

- **DBE Service Level Agreement** meetings: three (3) Service Level Agreement (SLA) meetings took place between DBE and SITA on 24 July, 23 August and 20 September 2019.
- Information Communication and Technology (ICT)
 Governance: A security policy was reviewed and approved.
 The objective of the review was to give all DBE users access to internet, as the previous version had denied some users to internet access.

Financial Services

• Monthly Conditional Grants Expenditure reports were received from Provincial Education Departments (PEDs), consolidated and submitted to National Treasury as prescribed by the Division of Revenue Act.





Financial Services...

 Payment of Invoices within 30 days: All invoices that were received during the reporting period, were processed within 30 days, except in isolated cases where managers were not available to sign off invoices for processing.

Asset and Security Management

- A new Occupational Health and Safety Organisational structure was established. Support to the DBE Intervention Team in the North West province: Security and Asset Management is responsible for providing security service to the DBE Intervention Team.
- An emergency evacuation drill was successfully conducted on 26 June 2019.





Logistics

- A standard Request for Quotation (RFQ) was developed and implemented. The RFQ form needs to be completed by the Service Providers and as such are compelled to provide the most needed information required by Supply Chain Management(SCM).
- Bid committee meetings: Three (3) sets of Terms of Reference out of five (5) for this quarter have been reviewed by the Bid Specification Committee (BSC) and presented to the Bid Adjudication Committee (BAC) for recommendation to the Accounting Officer.





Quality Learning and Teaching Campaign (QLTC)

- The Provincial Ayi Hlome Ifunde workshop was held together with the Quality Coordinating Team (QCT) to train and launch School Governing Body (SGB) QLTC structures as well as launch the District QLTC Steering Committee on 21-26 August 2019.
- The workshop involved one principal, the SGB Chairperson, the QLTC Secretary and one member of the Representative Council for Learners (RCL) to analyse results and focus on roles and responsibilities.





Quality Learning and Teaching Campaign (QLTC)...

- **Sekhukhune**: The QLTC **activities** were held on 05 July and 30 August 2019.
- Quality co-ordinating team and the provincial coordinators in their last meeting held at DBE committed to the re-establishment and the resuscitation of the QLTC structures across the provinces and the districts as part of their 100 days plan moving forward.
- All the sixteen (16) circuits were clustered and workshopped on their role and responsibilities. The circuits were clustered in four (4) different venues according to their geographical location.

During the period under review, 01 July – 30 September 2019, Twenty (20) meetings were scheduled, of which twelve (12) meetings were convened and further, two (2) unscheduled meetings were convened, i.e. one (1) SMM, one (1) CEM workshop. Eight (8) meetings could not be convened and these comprised of one (1) BMM, five (5) SMM, one (1) SPCHD and one (1) SPCHD TWG. The DBE has successfully managed the logistical arrangements, agendasetting and record drafting for all the convened meetings.





- Early Grade Reading Study II (EGRSII): Implementation continued with instructional coaching interventions in the districts of Ehlanzeni and Gert Sibande in Mpumalanga.
- Cluster- based training was organised for 167 intervention teachers at various school locations on 08 11 July 2019.
- The Project Management Team (PMT) held a meeting for the quarter on 25 July 2019, where overall implementation progress was shared including the tentative midline results of the Year 2 data collection of 2018.





- Early Grade Mathematics Project (EGMP): The project aims to evaluate and build effective interventions to improve the teaching and learning of Mathematics in the Foundation Phase.
 - An inception report was submitted in June 2019. The subject advisor and teacher training observation tools were developed and finalised before the training.
- Subject advisor training took place in June 2019, and teacher training on 16-24 July 2019.
- School visits and classroom observations took place between 19 August and 13 September 2019 in 12 schools across the three (3) provinces.





- Branch and sector support: The directorate continued to provide support to branches based on the needs/requests received. These include:
 - Whole School Evaluation (WSE).
 - Early Childhood Development (ECD) migration from the Department of Social Development (DSD) to the DBE.
- General Household Survey Report: The DBE completed the General Household Survey (GHS) 2018: Focus on schooling report, and it has been approved.
 - The report was presented to the Education Management Information System (EMIS) HEDCOM-Subcommittee on 11 September 2019.





- The DBE has developed a research repository as an institutional knowledge management mechanism. The repository contains sector-specific research that has been commissioned and conducted within the DBE, 120 reports have been included and grouped into 12 themes.
- Capacity Building: The DBE packaged and presented a capacity-building workshop to the Limpopo Department of Education, mainly focusing on quantitative and qualitative data analysis methods.
 - The training took place at the Mastec Centre in Limpopo over two days from 10- 11 July 2019.
 - 20 colleagues from various directorates of the PEDs participated.
 - Provincial strategic planning support in Limpopo and Eastern





- The Reading Support Project (RSP): This scaled-up implementation of Early Grade Reading Study (EGRS I) in NW now known as the RSP is being implemented in 263 schools in the Ngaka Modiri Molema and Dr Kenneth Kaunda districts.
- The **training** of coaches took place over three (3) days from 1-3 October in **preparation** for **Term 3 implementation**, and teacher training took place on 8-11 July 2019. **Implementation** of lesson plans took place **throughout Term 3**.
- A design and Implementation Evaluation of the RSP were commissioned, evaluating the extent to which the RSP is being implemented with fidelity, with a particular focus on whether it is being implemented in line with the predecessor programme EGRS.





- The **2018/19 Annual Reports** for the DBE and both its Public Entities (SACE and Umalusi), were **tabled** in Parliament on 30 September 2019.
- The Departmental **preliminary first quarter performance report** was submitted to the reporting bodies on **31 July 2019**.
- Outcome 7, 13 and 14 first quarter reports were submitted to the lead Departments in July and August 2019.
- The **Public Entities' (SACE and Umalusi) first quarter reports** were **analysed** and feedback was sent to the entities on **05 September 2019**.
- Branch Reviews were held from 14 19 August 2019 to provide feedback on first quarter performance information and introduced the revised framework for Strategic Plans (SPs) and Annual Performance Plans (APPs).





Office of the Director-General

- AGSA Meetings on audit issues: DG held meetings with AGSA and managers. The meetings were
 chaired by the Director-General.
- Monthly Infrastructure Meetings: DG held 3 monthly meetings with Infrastructure
 Implementing Agents, ASIDI teams and Infrastructure Provincial teams to track progress on ASIDI and EIG projects.
- Middle managers meeting with Director-General: co-ordinated middle managers meeting with the Director-General on important sector deliverables.
- **SONA inputs:** DG held meeting with Branches to track progress on SONA inputs.
- *Oracle and IBM meetings*: coordinated DG's meeting with Oracle, IBM on Focus School initiative and signing of the MoU.
- *Meeting with Microsoft:* coordinated the meeting with Microsoft on strategic alignment
- **Focus schools champion meetings:** coordinated meetings with identified focus schools champions.
- **Equal Education meeting:** coordinated the meeting with EEA to discuss the state of education.
- Meetings with DG's from other Departments: coordinated meetings with Department of Communication DG, Department of Sport and Culture DG, Correctional Services DG and Telecommunication and Postal Services DG to discuss a way forward on the focus schools initiative.
- Meeting with ambassadors: Coordinated a meetings with ambassadors of with South Korea,
 France and United of Arab Emirates to engage on Sector priorities





- Office of the Director-General
- **North West Section 100 Intervention:** Co-ordinated the meeting between the Minister, HoD, Administrator and North West Senior Management on Section 100 Intervention.
- **DG's Engagements in Provinces:** During the quarter under review, DG conducted 2nd phase of 2019 provincial engagements in 9 provinces from 12 August to 27 August 2019, with Provincial and District officials, and 2nd session of the meetings with Focus Schools Provincial Principals. The purpose of the engagements 1st session was about the progress made in improving learning outcomes and 2nd session to take the focus schools initiative forward with Focus schools principals.
- Quarterly Meetings with Entities: Co-ordinated a meeting with the Entities reporting to the DBE. The purpose of this meeting was to reflect on the work of the entities. Minutes of the meeting are available.

PROGRAMME 2: CURRICULUM POLICY, SUPPORT AND MONITORING

The purpose of Programme 2 is to develop curriculum and assessment policies and monitor and support their implementation.



CURRICULUM AND QUALITY ENHANCEMENT PROGRAMMES

Learning and Teaching Support Materials (LTSM)

- **Delivery of Grades R-9 workbooks** commenced at the beginning of August 2019.
- A total number of 30 929 260 (96.65%) of 32 001
 155 volume 1 workbooks have been delivered to 22
 695 (97%) out of 23 178 public schools.
- Printing of volume 2 workbooks has been commenced and a total number of 21 547 849 (79%) out of 27 237 500 volume 2 workbooks has been printed.





CURRICULUM AND QUALITY ENHANCEMENT PROGRAMMES

Mathematics, Science and Technology (MST)

- Training Sessions and Technical schools were monitored for the implementation of Curriculum and Assessment Policy Statements (CAPS).
- September vacation classes for grade 12 were successfully monitored.
- Subject committee meetings for Technical Subjects and Standardisation workshop were conducted September 2019.





Rural Education (RE)

- Collected data from participants in the sampled schools through questionnaires (distributed to 188 schools), structured and semi-structured interviews (with principals, mentor teachers and Education Assistants) and observations (curricular and co-curricular activities) was analysed and written up.
- A report on the preliminary findings was presented to the Project Steering Committee meeting.





Rural Education (RE)

- Inputs of the campaigns conducted during the previous quarter were incorporated into the Policy, and the Policy was changed into a Framework as per directive of the majority Provincial counterparts.
- A draft Rural Education Framework has been finalised.
- The DBE provided support in conducting the advocacy campaigns on the RE Framework in four provinces, GP, NW, FS, and LP.





Curriculum Innovation and eLearning (ICT)

- Quality assurance of Computer Application Technology (CAT) and Information Technology (IT) state-owned textbooks was conducted in August 2019. "Guidelines on e-Safety in Schools" documents to 150 to EC Technology in Education roundtable were distributed.
- Nine (9) schools were monitored as part of the DBE Provincial ICT Implementation.
- 115 Schools provided with the Universal Service and Access Obligation (USAO) solution (NW 55, GP 39 and MP 21).





Curriculum Innovation and eLearning (ICT)

- 312 subject advisors and 690 teachers were trained on ICT integration using Modular Object-oriented Dynamic Learning Environment (MOODLE) in EC, LP, GP MP, FS and NC.
- 124 Subject Specialists and Centre Managers (40 NW, 44 NC and 40 EC) were trained on how to use the broadcasting solution (OVHD Channel 134) into teaching and learning.
- A total of 120 e-Library solutions (trolleys, laptops, data projectors and Content Access points) were distributed to the following provinces (35 NW, 10 GP, 25 KZN, 25 MP and 25 LP).





CURRICULUM IMPLEMENTATION AND MONITORING Early Childhood Development (ECD)

- Trained 1 393 ECD practitioners across all the nine (9)
 Provinces on the National Curriculum Framework (NCF). Of the 42 000 ECD practitioners targeted to complete the online training programme on play-based learning, 64 573 (154%) completed the ECD P.L.A.Y. online training courses.
- 180 South African Congress of Early Childhood Development (SACECD) trainers were trained on the implementation of the NCF for children from birth to four.
- In collaboration with the National Education Collaboration Trust (NECT), seven (7) dialogues have taken place with external stakeholders to keep them abreast of the developments related to the migration shift.





Inclusive Education (IE)

- The DBE conducted monitoring and support visits to EC, FS, NC and NW to strengthen implementation of the Learning Programme for Learners with Severe to Profound Intellectual Disability (LSPID) Conditional Grant.
- 99 transversal itinerant outreach team members were trained on the repackaged Learning Programme for LSPID for EC, FS, KZN, NC and WC.
- The roll-out of connectivity and specialised devices to Special schools is underway.
 - Vodacom and MTN have both completed their pilot schools.





Inclusive Education (IE)

- DBE together with the Independent Communications
 Authority of South Africa (ICASA) and the Department of
 Telecommunications and Postal Services (DTPS) visited
 Bartimea School for the blind and deaf in Free State on 5
 August 2019 to support Neotal/Liquid to complete their
 assessment on specialised assistive devices.
- Circular S4 sent to PEDs to request them to consider the temporary suspension of the designation of full-service schools to ensure that those that have been designated are adequately capacitated to fulfil their roles and responsibilities as stipulated in the Guidelines for Fullservice/Inclusive Schools of 2010.





Further Education and Training (FET)

- The History Ministerial Task Team conducted work sessions on 6 July, 3-4 August, 7-8 September and 28-29 September 2019.
- The work sessions achieved the following:
 - Identification of the content to make up the curriculum;
 - Arrangement and sequencing of content to ensure progression from Grade 4-12;
 - Presentations on the draft curriculum for Grades 4-8;
 - Development unit of the DHET; and
 - Dealing with the Grade 9 content.





Further Education and Training (FET)

- The development and distribution of the Grade 11 Exemplar Business Studies and Accounting Question papers and Grade 11 Examination guidelines was finalised.
- Developed Mind The Gap Literature Study Guide for Home Languages including South African Sign Language (SASL).
- Developed and submitted the 2019 Midyear Evidence Based Report (EBR) and conducted Subject Committee Meetings for all Further Education and Training (FET) subjects.
- Conducted monitoring of Spring Schools on 23-27 September and a Preparatory Workshop for 2019 NSC Standardisation on 18-19 September 2019.





General Education and Training (GET)

- 27 schools were monitored on the Early Grade Reading Assessment (EGRA) programme.
- The implementation of the Multi-grade Toolkit was monitored in 18 schools.
- Subject committee meetings were held in the various GET subjects.
- The Incremental Introduction of African Languages (IIAL) programme was **monitored** in **10 schools**.
- The implementation of the Reading Norms were monitored in ten (10) schools.

PROGRAMME 3: TEACHERS, EDUCATION HUMAN RESOURCES AND INSTITUTIONAL DEVELOPMENT

The purpose of Programme 3 is to promote quality teaching and institutional performance through the effective supply, development and utilisation of human resources.



EDUCATION HUMAN RESOURCE MANAGEMENT

Educator Performance Management and Development and Whole School Evaluation

- Provincial coordinators monitored a total of 1 468 schools across six PEDs (FS, GP, KZN, MP, NW and NC) for support on performance management.
- The Quality Management System (QMS) for school-based educators was processed at the Education Labour Relations Council (ELRC) on 3 September 2019. The agreement streamlines the Integrated Quality Management System (IQMS) and introduces workplans to be signed between principals, deputy principals and departmental heads.
- Indicator Framework for Whole School Evaluation (WSE) developed to inform external evaluation school reporting.





Education Human Resource Planning, Provisioning and Monitoring

- Monitored the **implementation** of the post provisioning policy in all nine (9) PEDs.
 - Received and analysed reports on the overall vacancy rate per post, schedules on filling of vacancies at schools; and placement of educators declared.
- A total of 2 582 (preliminary figure covering July-August 2019 only) young and qualified educators were appointed in posts in the PEDs of which 440 were permanent and 1856 were temporary, and 298 were substitute/relief appointments.





Education Human Resource Planning, Provisioning and Monitoring

- 74% (3 242 of 4 376) Funza Lushaka graduates were placed as at the end of September 2019.
- All PEDs have implemented pay progression to all qualifying educators in July and August at 1% and 0.5% respectively to achieve the agreed 1.5% equalisation.
- PEDs are currently correcting the exceptions that resulted from payment in order to ensure that there are no anomalies in payment of educator salaries.





Education Labour Relations and Conditions of Service

- ECD Work Stream: ECD Work Stream report to be presented by the General Secretary of the ELRC to HEDCOM was finalised.
- Majority support of the ELRC Collective Agreement 2 of 2014: Quality Management System (QMS) for School-Based Educators and an Addendum to the Agreement was signed on 3 September 2019.
- Due to the new developments in the conditions of service, the ELRC engaged in a legal Task Team to deal with the amendments to the Personnel Administration Measures (PAM).
 - Once completed, these amendments will be gazetted.





Initial Teacher Education

- Developed an instrument that will be used by the NSFAS during the debt recovery process of defaulting bursary holders.
- A preliminary placement dataset for 2019 graduates that will be placed in 2020 was developed.
 - -5352 Potential graduates were identified.





Education Management and Governance Development (EMGD)

- Completed course content for the development of the Advanced Diploma in School leadership and Management.
- Consultations were held with provinces to review the draft Framework for the Induction of Newly Appointed Principals.
- The DBE continued to train School Management Teams of Curriculum Management and the Strategy to Support Poor Performing Schools in Free State, Limpopo and North West.





<u>Continuing Professional Teacher Development</u> (<u>CPTD</u>)

- The Grade R data collection tool was approved and sent to PEDs for them to update their Grade R practitioners qualification levels for the 2019/20 financial year.
- The National Teacher Awards (NTA) adjudication orientation manual was developed, used to train 1 500 provincial adjudicators in all provinces from the 15 July – 21 August 2019.





CURRICULUM AND PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT LTSM Policy Development and Innovation

- Primary School Reading Improvement Programme (PSRIP): The first Sector Reading Programme meeting was held on 3 July 2019 with various stakeholders, to integrate all existing Early Grade Reading programmes into the PSRIP.
 - 30 SMTs Master Trainers received training and proceeded to conduct training sessions for 1 881 SMT members in their Provinces.
 - 2 894 Foundation Phase (FP) teachers and 3 156 Intermediate Phase (IP) teachers have been trained.





LTSM Policy Development and Innovation

- National Reading Coalition (NRC):
- Ten (10) schools from ten (10) circuits, (one (1) school per circuit) in Mpumalanga and Limpopo were presented with wheelie-bin-libraries containing 350 FP reading books, 300 in African languages and 50 in English.

Teacher Development Implementation (TDI)

- NSC support for Mathematics and Physical Science teachers in 12 districts
 - 1742 teachers participated on a three- day South African Council of Educators (SACE)-endorsed programme.
 - The programme focused on content, pedagogy and diagnostic assessment through paper and pencil was taken by the NSC Mathematics and Physical Science teachers.





Teacher Development Implementation (TDI)

- Two (2) Training Manuals for FET Accounting and Economics teachers were completed and are being printed. The training of teachers is planned from October 2019 to February 2020.
- The Foundation Phase Mathematics and Literacy are being supported through the following:
 - The NECT-led Teaching Mathematics for understanding (TMU); and
 - Treasury funded project for Mpumalanga.

PROGRAMME 4: PLANNING, INFORMATION AND ASSESSMENT

The purpose of Programme 4 is to promote quality and effective service delivery in the basic education system through planning, implementation and assessment.



Programme 4...

NATIONAL ASSESSMENT AND PUBLIC EXAMINATION

Examinations and Assessments in School

- A total of 145 NSC question papers for the November 2019 examinations have been sent to PEDs, 43 non-official language papers and 40 question papers adapted for the deaf. 56 question papers were handed to Braille houses for adaptation.
- 63 question papers were also handed over to Braille houses for adaptation into large prints.
- Ten (10) question papers for the grade 10 and 11 common examinations in English First Additional language(FAL); P3 Mathematics and Physical Sciences have been set, moderated, quality assured and are ready for collection by PEDs.





Examinations and Assessments in School...

- Four (4) exemplar question papers for Business Studies and Accounting were set by the Curriculum section, moderated and reviewed by Examinations, sent and released to PEDs.
- These were done to assist and prepare teachers and learners for the introduction of two (2) papers of Accounting and Business Studies in Grade 11 in 2019.
- Practical Assessment Tasks (PATs) in the 17 subjects have been sent to Umalusi for external moderation.
- 39 of the 143 question papers for June 2020 are currently undergoing external moderation. The other papers for June 2020 have been approved by Umalusi.





NATIONAL ASSESSMENT AND PUBLIC EXAMINATION

Examinations and Assessments in School

- State of Readiness Visits: conducted a state of readiness support visit to all nine (9) PEDs from 10 September to 1 October 2019 to ensure that the PEDs are ready to administer the November 2019 examinations.
- The visit focused on establishing the progress made by the PEDs in responding to the areas of weakness as identified during the previous monitoring and review visits and the level of readiness of the PEDs to administer the November 2019 examinations; as well as identification of risk areas with a view of developing mitigating strategies to ensure that the credibility of the November examination is not compromised.
- The DBE has also completed the recruitment of 31 part time monitors.





Examinations and Assessments in School

- **Hosting** of the 2019 NSC Life Orientation (LO) Computer Application **Technology** (CAT) **marking standardisation** meeting.
- **Hosting** of the 2019 Design P2 and Visual Arts P2 **marking standardisation** meetings and **interactive training** on peer moderation of learners' final artworks and sourcebooks.
- Hosting of the 2019 NSC LO CAT marking standardisation meeting and training of Provincial LO officials. Final making guideline approved by Umalusi and disseminated to all PEDs.
- Implementation of phase 2 Quality Assurance of PEDs School Based Assessment (SBA) moderation by the DBE in nine (9) PEDs from 23 September 2019 until 6 October 2019.





NATIONAL ASSESSMENT AND PUBLIC EXAMINATION

Examination Administration

- NSC 2018-November exam: Bulk certification of the November exam and re-mark/re-check has been completed by all provinces.
- June 2019 Exam: The exam has been completed successfully and all the provinces have issued the Statement of Results to candidates.





Examination Administration

- NSC 2019-November Exam: Registration of candidates
 has been completed. All the exam material has been
 generated and distributed. Sita and Umalusi are
 finalising the last components of the Dry-Run of the
 system for the December 2019 processes.
- SC 2019-November exam: Registration of these candidates has been finalised. State Information Technology Agency (SITA) has finalised the amendments to the system to manage the processing and resulting of these candidates.





National Assessments

- Early Learning National Assessment (ELNA): Grade R-1 Language and Mathematics instruments were pre-piloted in Gauteng schools.
- Teaching and Learning International Survey (TALIS) 2018: A country report was launched and findings were presented by the Organisation of Economic Co-Operation and Development (OECD).
- Systemic Evaluation: A workshop with the Australian Council for Educational Research was held with examiners to select items based on the pilot data.
- Contextual questionnaires and test forms were finalised.
 Numeracy Chairs with the Wits and Rhodes University: Diagnostic assessments on mental strategies and strategic thinking for Grade 3 Mathematics were field tested in 54 schools in GP, NW and EC.

Grant Management

 First quarter reports, Annual Performance Evaluation Report and draft 2020 Division of Revenue Act on conditional grants has been submitted to National Treasury.

 letter is written to the HOD, requesting an explanation and reasons for
 the poor performance and a turnaround plan to improve the situation.
 - Response is evaluated and if not sufficient, the transfer of the education
 Infrastructure Grant (EIG) tranche is withheld for not more than 30 days.
 - During that period, the DBE closely monitors the performance through meetings and interventions.
 - If there is still no progress, the province is informed in writing that the funding will be withheld and the DBE then determines a province or provinces that is/are likely to spend the funds due to overheating of their programme, and the funding is then redirected to those provinces.

CARE AND SUPPORT IN SCHOOLS

School Nutrition

- 36 monitoring and evaluation visits were conducted.
- Findings show that schools are in compliance with feeding, hygiene & food safety.

Health Promotion

 The Integrated Care and Support Operation was conducted in Gert Sibande, Mpumalanga province on 02-17 September 2019. The Operation preceded by build-up activities that included parents dialogues on the DBE National Policy on Human Immunodeficiency Virus (HIV) and Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome (AIDS) Policy and provision of sexual and reproductive health service that were to be provided to learners.





Health Promotion...

- 800 parents were reached through dialogues on 02-6 September.
- 3 270 learners reached through safety and protection awareness on 09-13 September 2019.
- 1 500 learners and community members were reached through integrated service delivery.
- 50 educators and support staff were reached through employee health and wellness programmes during the main event held on 17 September 2019.
