Physical Human Resources:

- This is and has been huge challenge for some time. Despite the efforts made to bolster the forces, it is just not enough.
- The insufficient resources impact on response times, effective policing of serious and contact crimes and ultimately, service delivery.
- The Khayelitsha Commission has recommended the equitable allocation of SAPS resources. This should be in line with the reprioritising of staff levels to the top 10 stations as identified by the crime data (treats, patterns and action needed) and the need for intervention.

Key drivers of crime:

- The report identifies the top 10 drivers that contribute to crime.
- These include but is not limited to; drug and alcohol abuse, unemployment, poverty and gangsterism.
- These drivers indicate that our main contributing factor here is the socio-economic causes of crime.
- Policing the drug and alcohol outlets alone, will not address this issue. We need to address the root causes and go back to the assisting enforcement agencies policing the “B” crimes while SAPS focuses on policing crimes. We need to effect change to the socio-economic situation to bring about change in crime. Address the “Broken Window” and focus on Crime Prevention through Environmental Design (CPTED).

Key drivers of crime: Continued

- Removing the drugs and alcohol from circulation (vehicle check points / stop and searches) will be more effective than policing the outlets.
- Youth at risk initiatives needs to be up-scaled to save our youth from succumbing to gangsterism.

Community Partnerships:

- Crime is not the responsibility of the Police alone. The community shares this responsibility. Active community partnerships needs to be formed to regain the confidence and trust in Police.
- Crime and violence prevention initiatives needs to be at the forefront of this partnership.

Victim Support:

- Officers in the front line (not only victim support units) need to be properly trained to be aware of their emotional intelligence to professionally deal with victims of crime.
- This level of support should be unquestionably delivered on first contact with the police (patrol officer or the Community Service Centres).
- There should be follow-ups and progress reports with the victims to fulfil the cycle of service delivery and client orientation. This will ensure follow through with victim support and not only what victims receive at the various centres.
- Retraining of staff on GBV and not just DVA.

Innovative Policing:

- It is inevitable that the development and growth of technology around the world will be incorporated in everything we do. E.g. CCTV, EPIC, LPR and Video Analytics
- So to, the Police should evolve and develop to adopt technology into policing methodologies to enhance policing and service delivery.

Sharing of information and intelligence:

- This is of utmost importance to ensure that all enforcement agencies are on the same page and work jointly, in collaboration to achieve our common goals.
- Support for uniform ito counselling/debriefing.



Collaboration with SAPS

- Re-establishment of mobile biometric screening equipment like Morphotouch
- Placing CoCT by-laws on CAS
- Integration of TMC and SAPS War Room
- Effective collaboration around CCTV and gunfire detection (with both being extended)
- Extension of EPIC for use by SAPS and giving SAPS access to ICM



Collaboration with SAPS

- Integration of radio services
- More effective sharing of crime stats and crime intelligence, crime threat analysis – for purpose of building predictive policing models
- Drones (awaiting CAA authority)
