Division of Revenue Amendments Bill – Proposed amendments

Explanatory Memorandum)

Division of Revenue Act

Act passed by Parliament and signed by the President in June 2022, contains:

- Clauses of the Act set requirements for transfer of funds, reporting on funds, conditions that may be set for grants and enforcement mechanisms
- Schedules to the Act contain equitable share and grant allocations

Government Gazette

[Act 5 of 2022]

224 page gazette signed by the Minister of Finance contains:

- Grant frameworks setting out conditions and responsibilities attached to each conditional grant
- Allocations per individual municipality
- Supplementary detail for allocations (e.g. split per grant component)

Bill

Bill tabled on 26 October 2022 contains:

- · Additional clause to allow for pledging of conditional allocations
- In-year adjustments to allocations, consistent with limitations in S30 of the PFMA
- Request to correct some gazetted frameworks

Section 30(2) of the PFMA says that a national adjustments budget may only provide for:

- adjustments required due to significant and unforeseeable economic and financial events affecting the fiscal targets set by the annual budget;
- unforeseeable and unavoidable expenditure recommended by the national executive or any committee of Cabinet members to whom this task has been assigned;
- any expenditure in terms of section 16;
- money to be appropriated for expenditure already announced by the Minister during the tabling of the annual budget;
- the shifting of funds between and within votes or to follow the transfer of functions in terms of section 42;
- the utilisation of savings under a main division of a vote for the defrayment of excess expenditure under another main division of the same vote in terms of section. 43; and
- the **roll-over of unspent funds** from the preceding financial year.

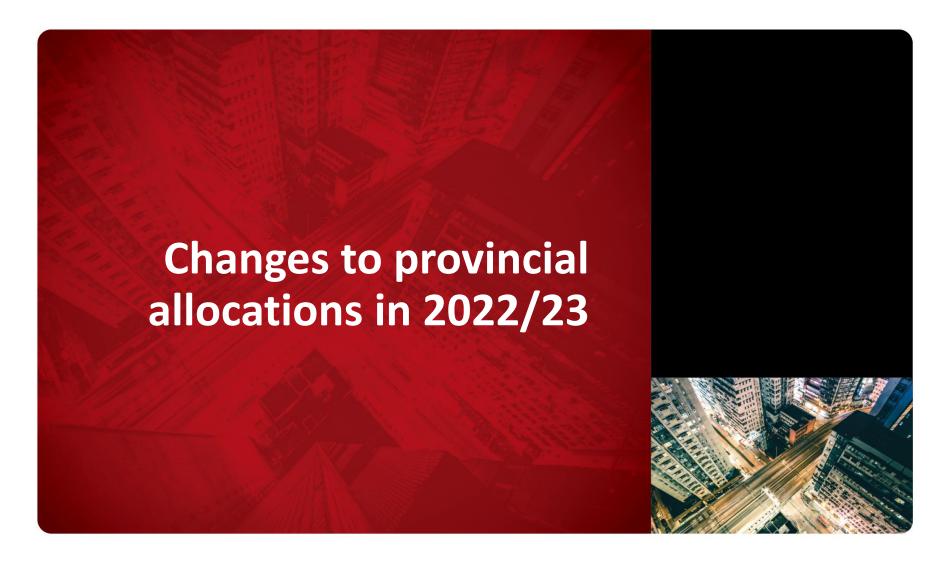
- The main purpose of the DoRAB is to amend "Column A" of the DoRA schedules which shows the allocation for the current year
- The new "Column A" created by the DoRAB shows the original allocation, the adjustment(s) and the new allocation so as to maximise transparency in the adjustment process
- "Column A" is amended for schedules 1, 2, 4 (Part A), 5(Part B), 6 (Part B) and 7 (Parts A & B)

Disaster response funding

Conversion of disaster response grants

- To allow for adequate response to the April 2022 floods, funding was shifted between disaster grants in August 2022
 - R145 million was shifted from the Provincial Disaster Response Grant to the Municipal Disaster Response
 Grant
 - R120 million was shifted from the Municipal Emergency Housing Grant to the Provincial Emergency Housing Grant

Additional funding for disaster response grants

- To cater for disasters that may occur in the remaining months of the current financial year
 - R97 million is added to the *Provincial Disaster Response Grant*
 - R350 million is added to the Provincial Emergency Housing Grant

Additional funding for disaster reconstruction and rehabilitation

- For the reconstruction and rehabilitation of provincial infrastructure damaged by the December 2021 and April 2022 floods
 - R117 million is added to the Education Infrastructure Grant for Eastern Cape and KwaZulu-Natal
 - R1 billion is added to the Provincial Roads Maintenance Grant for Eastern Cape, KwaZulu-Natal and North-West

Protection and care of flood victims

 R49 million is added to the Provincial Equitable Share to continue with the care and protection of April 2022 flood victims placed in shelters in KwaZulu-Natal

Additions to provincial allocations

- R389 million is added to the *Provincial Roads Maintenance Grant* for the construction of modular steel bridges in Eastern Cape and Limpopo
 - Eastern Cape: R308 million
 - Limpopo: R81 million
- Construction of the bridges is part of the Welisizwe Rural Bridges Programme
- Provinces were selected on the extent of implementation readiness (assessed by the Department of Public Works and Infrastructure)

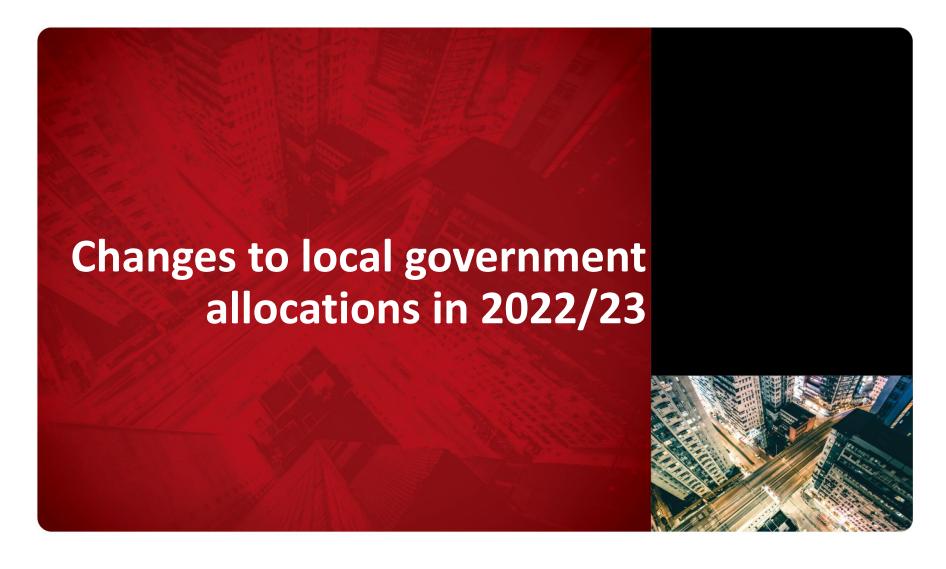

Disaster response funding

Conversion of disaster response grants

- To allow for adequate response to the April 2022 floods, funding was shifted between disaster grants in August 2022
 - R145 million was shifted from the Provincial Disaster Response Grant to the Municipal Disaster Response
 Grant
 - R120 million was shifted from the Municipal Emergency Housing Grant to the Provincial Emergency Housing Grant

Additional funding for disaster response grants

- To cater for disasters that may occur in the remaining months of the current financial year
 - R248 million is added to the Municipal Disaster Response Grant

Additional funding for disaster reconstruction and rehabilitation

- For the reconstruction and rehabilitation of municipal infrastructure damaged by the December 2021 and April 2022 floods R3.3 billion is added to the *Municipal Disaster Recovery Grant* for Eastern Cape and KwaZulu Natal and Western Cape
 - Eastern cape (Winnie Madikizela-Mandela Local Municipality): R34 million
 - KwaZulu Natal municipalities: R3 billion
 - Western Cape district municipalities: R290 million

Purchasing of land for relocation of flood victims

 R92 million is added to the Informal Settlements Upgrading Partnership Grant: Municipalities for eThekwini Metropolitan Municipality for the purchase of land identified for the relocation of displaced flood victims

Changes to local government allocations

Roll-overs

- R1 million is rolled over in the *Integrated National Electrification Programme Grant* to fund 50 electrification connections in Sewendelaan in Dikgatlong Municipality
- R15 million is rolled over in the indirect Regional Bulk Infrastructure Grant to fund operational payments for the Vaal River pollution remediation project in Emfuleni Local Municipality

Reprioritisations

- R100 million of the Neighbourhood Development Partnership Grant is shifted from direct component of the grant to the indirect component of the grant
 - Reprioritised funds will be used for project preparation, planning and implementation for municipalities having challenges that are affecting project implementation
 - These funds will be used for projects they were allocated for in the direct component

Annexures to the Bill

- Section 15(4) of the Division of Revenue Act, 2022, requires National Treasury to consult Parliament on any proposed changes to a conditional grant framework for the purposes of correcting an error or omission
- Parliament is requested to consider and approve the changes to the conditional grant frameworks outlined on the subsequent slide
- Once the Bill is enacted, National Treasury will gazette:
 - The amended frameworks (as shown in Annexures B and C of the Bill)
 - The amended allocations per municipality as outlined in Annexures D and E; and Appendix A of the Bill
 - The changes per province for disaster response allocations in Appendix B of the Bill

Changes to gazetted frameworks & allocations

Provincial Roads Maintenance Grant

 The grant framework is amended to allow for spending to respond to the disaster that occurred in April 2022; and for spending on rural bridges under the Welisizwe Rural Bridges Programme

Education Infrastructure Grant and Municipal Disaster Response Grant

• The grant frameworks are amended to allow for spending to respond to the disasters that occurred in December 2021 and April 2022

Informal Settlements Upgrading Partnership Grant: Municipalities

 The grant framework is amended to ring-fence funds for the purchase of identified land for the relocation of flood victims who previously resided in informal settlements that were washed by the floods

Municipal annexures

- Changes to previously gazetted municipal allocations include a change of the name of a municipality
 - The name of Engcobo Local Municipality in the Eastern Cape is updated to Dr. A.B. Xuma Local Municipality as per the Gazette published in terms of section 12 of the Local Government: Municipal Structures Act, on 30 May 2022

Correction of errors in the MDRG grant framework and allocations to municipalities

- The National Disaster Management Centre (NDMC) has requested changes to the in-year allocations for the *Municipal Disaster Recovery Grant (MDRG)* in the DoRAB tabled
 - Part of the funding allocated to uThukela and iLembe district municipalities in KwaZulu Natal (KZN) should have been allocated to Alfred Duma and KwaDukuza local municipalities, respectively (page 36 of the DoRAB)
 - Allocations made to the Cape Winelands, Overberg and Garden Route district municipalities in the Western Cape (WC) should have been made to Breede Valley; Theewaterskloof and Swellendam; and Oudtshoornf and George local municipalities, respectively (page 39 of the DoRAB)
 - The KZN errors are an oversight by the KZN Disaster Management Centre which submitted applications for roads; storm water; and water and sanitation infrastructure recovery projects to the NDMC as requests made by the district municipalities, which in turn, submitted the incorrect requests to the National Treasury
 - The WC errors are an oversight by the NDMC as the WC Disaster Management Centre submitted the applications as requests by the local municipalities, but the NDMC recommended to the National Treasury, approval of these as allocations to the district municipalities
 - The NDMC is checking the assignment of the respective functions to confirm what amounts need to be allocated to the respective local and district municipalities and is expected to write to the National Treasury to request that these allocations be corrected before the allocations per municipality are gazetted
- These corrections also affect the ring-fencing in the MDRG framework (page 28 of the DoRAB)
- Parliament is requested to approve that National Treasury corrects the allocations and effect the required changes to the MDRG framework (and corrected as part of s15(1) process) to ensure that MDRG allocations are correctly allocated to the municipalities assigned for the functions









Changes in the Bill clauses

- Section 7 of 2022 Division of Revenue Act is amended to allow for the pledging of provincial conditional grants
 - This follows announcement made by the Minister of Finance in the 2022 Budget Speech
 - The clause specifies the process that provinces are required to follow if they intend to pledge their conditional grants, including the relevant consultation processes and the conditions that must be complied with

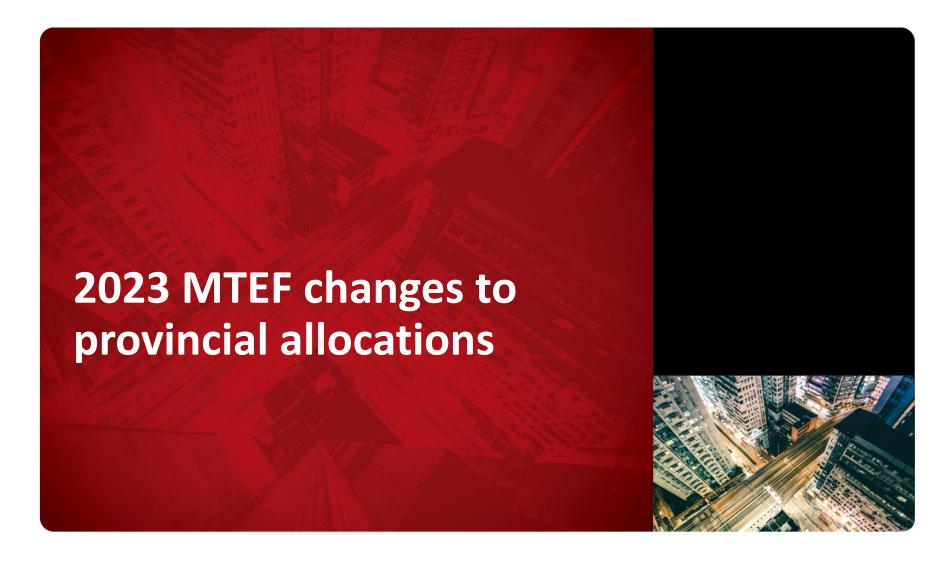


2023 Division of Revenue in the MTBPS

- over the 2023 MTEF, national government resources remain stagnant with little to no growth, provincial resources increase by an annual average rate of 2.8 per cent and local government resources increase by 6 per cent
- No spending reductions are proposed in the 2022 MTBPS
- Over the medium-term:
 - The provincial equitable share increases by an average annual rate of 2.4 per cent and provincial conditional grants increase by 4.3 per cent
 - The local government equitable share increases at an annual average rate of 7.8 per cent and municipal conditional grants increase by 3.6 per cent

Changes to provincial allocations - 2023 MTEF (1 of 3)

Provincial equitable share

- Amounts of R5.7 billion in 2023/24, R6.7 billion in 2024/15 and R7.6 billion in 2025/26 R20 billion over the MTEF are added for CoE pressures within the education sector
- Amounts of R7.5 billion in 2023/24, R7.8 billion in 2024/25 and R8.1 billion in 2025/26 are added for the health sector to cover pressures in compensation of employees, service backlogs, including for anti-retroviral and tuberculosis treatment, laboratory services and other goods and services including medicines and medical supplies

Changes to provincial allocations - 2023 MTEF (2 of 3)

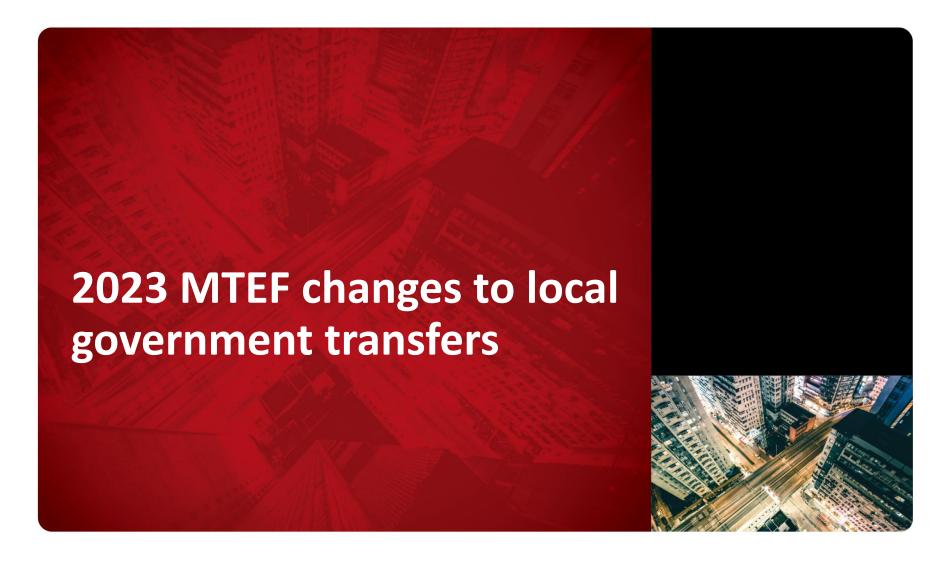
Provincial conditional grants

- R1.6 billion is added to the Early Childhood Development Grant to build DBE's oversight and monitoring capacity, and to improve and expand early childhood development services in provinces
- R1.5 billion is added to the *National School Nutrition Programme Grant* to continue providing nutritious meals to 9 million learners each school day
- R300 million in 2023/24 is added to the *Education Infrastructure Grant* for the carry through costs for disasters that happened in April 2022
- R7.1 billion is added to the *Provincial Roads Maintenance Grant* for the backlog in refurbishment of provincial roads

Changes to provincial allocations - 2023 MTEF (3 of 3)

Budget Facility for Infrastructure (BFI) funding

- Funding has been added to several conditional grants through the BFI
 - R144 million is added to the Comprehensive Agricultural Support Programme Grant for KwaZulu-Natal agri-hub
 - R1.5 billion is added to the *Education Infrastructure Grant* for Gauteng Schools Programme
 - R3.7 billion is added to the *Provincial Roads Maintenance Grant* for the building of modular steel bridges (rural bridges)
- R1.8 billion is allocated to the Coega Development Corporation for a water security programme that will construct and upgrade bulk infrastructure
 - Implementation of the project will allow for an indirect benefit to the Eastern Cape province
- The BFI allocation for Limpopo Central Hospital has been rescheduled
 - The rescheduling is done within the *National Health Insurance Indirect Grant* to align the allocations with the cash flow requirements of the project
 - The current baselines are rescheduled with the following amounts: -R372 million, R432
 million and R569 million









Changes to local government allocations – 2023 MTEF (1 of 4)

Additional allocations

- R5.3 billion has been added to the Local Government Equitable Share over the MTEF to increase coverage of the provision of free basic services
- Additional R2.8 billion to the Municipal Disaster Recovery Grant to fund the repair and reconstruction of municipal infrastructure damaged by the April 2022 floods

Reprioritisation

 R8 million in 2024/25 and R13 million in 2025/26 are reprioritised out of the Public Transport Network Grant to fund the roll out of the Single Integrated Ticketing System

Changes to local government allocations – 2023 MTEF (2 of 4)

BFI: Rescheduling

- Additions of R105 million in 2023/24, R40 million in 2024/25 and R316 million in 2025/26 in the *Public Transport Network Grant* to align to the revised implementation plan and cashflow projections for the City of Cape Town's MyCiTi public transport network
- A reduction of R136 million in 2023/24 and an addition of R1 million in 2024/25 to the *Regional Bulk Infrastructure Grant* to align to the revised implementation plan and cashflow projections for George Municipality's Potable Water Security and Remedial Works project

Changes to local government allocations – 2023 MTEF (3 of 4)

BFI: New allocations through direct conditional grants

• R6.5 billion over the MTEF is allocated to several municipalities to fund municipal infrastructure projects approved through the 6th window of the BFI
