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MESSAGE FROM THE CHIEF EXECUTIVE AND ARTISTIC DIRECTOR

BONGANI TEMBE

IT IS WITH GREAT EXCITEMENT THAT, AFTER MANY MONTHS OF CAREFUL PLANNING AND HARD WORK, WE ARE ABLE TO FINALLY SHARE THIS REPORT WITH YOU.

In the months that have followed the difficulties caused by the impact of COVID-19, I find myself so inspired by the creativity and innovation that is emerging from the performing arts sector. Sometimes difficulty forges beauty, tenacity, perseverance and commitment of our musicians and administrators to bring something truly wonderful into the world. It is an honour to be part of it.

In addition to the Mzansi Philharmonic's inaugural national tour, we are also excited about the Organisation's many other projects and programmes that seek to develop career paths for young musicians; fund and advocate for regional, local and youth orchestras; create access to the Orchestra for wider audiences; contribute to tourism by branding South Africa positively both locally and on the international stage; and to transform lives through the power of music.

Often, this idea of transformation can seem ethereal, but in the formation of the Mzansi National Philharmonic Orchestra, we have experienced it in a very tangible way. Our story is richly layered with real life examples of collaboration, of societal leadership, of inclusivity, of care for our fellow citizens, and of seeing people achieve their full potential. Perhaps this latter element of our work is the most meaningful of all.

During the year under review I am delighted to report that the Orchestra, whose musicians are drawn from six provinces around South Africa and a few South African musicians who are based in top orchestras abroad, reached thousands of South Africans of all ages and races, including learners. The Orchestra also achieved a lot of its objectives and mission such as helping to brand South Africa positively on the international stage. In this regard, some of our musicians were part of the G20 Orchestra in Indonesia and also travelled to Algeria for a cultural exchange festival. We are also proud that the Orchestra undertook a highly successful national tour and allocated R20 million to professional regional orchestras, youth orchestras, orchestral education programmes and other artistic endeavours.

We are very grateful to the leadership of the Chair and the Board of Directors, and thankful for the expertise and dedication of the management team and musicians, whose combined efforts have resulted in a very successful year for Mzansi National Philharmonic Orchestra.

JUSTICE LEONA THERON

Ms Leona Valerie Theron is a distinguished Justice on the Constitutional Court of South Africa. She was appointed to the Judge White Commission by President Mandela in 1995. Then, in 1999, she was appointed to the High Court of South Africa, making her the youngest judge in the country at 33 years old and also making her the first black female judge in the KwaZulu-Natal High Court. She has also served on the Court of Appeal in Bloemfontein.



MS WENDY Luhabe

Ms Luhabe is a social entrepreneur and economic activist with multiple honours for her pioneering contribution to the economic empowerment of women in South Africa. In 1999 she was recognised as one of the 50 Leading Women Entrepreneurs of the World. The World Economic Forum in Switzerland recognised her as a Global Leader of Tomorrow. Ms Luhabe is an experienced Director, serving on a number of eminent boards over the years.


PROF. MUXE NKONDO

Prof. Nkondo is a social policy, national strategy development, and discourse analysis scholar and practitioner, former Deputy Vice-Chancellor (Academic Affairs) at the University of North (now Limpopo), and Vice-Chancellor of the University of Venda, a Harvard Andrew Mellon Fellow in English. He has lectured at various universities, including Harvard, Oxford, Northwestern University in Chicago, Northeastern University in Boston, University of Connecticut, University of Oklahoma, Colorado College, Denver, USA, and Vassar College.

MR BONGANI Tembe

Bongani Tembe is widely regarded as one of Africa's leading arts practitioners. He has performed in many parts of the world and has contributed positively to the advancement of arts and culture in South Africa and internationally. In 2016, Mr Tembe was honoured by the French Government with the prestigious insignia of Officier des Arts et des Lettres, in recognition of his remarkable contribution to the arts. Bongani Tembe studied at the prestigious Julliard School in New York.







ARTISTIC PLANNING COMMITTEE

THE MZANSI PHILHARMONIC BOARD HAS ESTABLISHED THE ARTISTIC PLANNING COMMITTEE, FORMED WITH THE PURPOSE OF ENGAGING WITH AND ADVISING THE ORCHESTRA ON A NUMBER OF MATTERS, INCLUDING THE FOLLOWING:

- the allocation of the artistic budget of Mzansi Philharmonic, in particular, the funding to regional and youth orchestras;
- to provide high level input into the planning processes of Mzansi Philharmonic, in particular, input related to the calendar of events of Mzansi Philharmonic as this may impact on the programmes of regional orchestras;
- advise on the selection criteria for musicians who play for Mzansi Philharmonic;
- advise the Orchestra on other Mzansi Philharmonic artistic-related matters.



SAMSON DIAMOND

Samson Diamond is the appointed leader of the award-winning Odeion String Quartet since 2013, resident at the University of the Free State. He is lecturer at the Odeion School of Music and concertmaster of the Free State Symphony Orchestra (FSSO). Diamond has enjoyed an association with the London based, Chineke! Orchestra since its inception in 2015. Chineke! is Europe's first black and ethnic minority orchestra, and Diamond has had the honour of performing as their concertmaster for various international tours.

PROF. NINA Schumann

Nina holds a piano professorships at the University of Stellenbosch, passing on her artistic knowledge and producing students of the highest calibre. In addition, her services to the South African musical community include the cofounding of an independent record label, TwoPianists Records, and the founding of the renown Stellenbosch International Chamber Music Festival in 2004, which has quickly become the best-known chamber music festival on the African continent. TwoPianists records assumed the role of Yamaha International Artists in 2014.

KARENDRA DEVROOP

Karendra Devroop is the director of the University of South Africa's Music Foundation. He is also South Africa's leading saxophonist, having performed with most of South Africa's top jazz and classical talent and collaborated with an impressive list of artists from all over the world. Karendra has several live and studio recordings to his credit. In addition to his small ensemble and big band work, he has recently performed as soloist with the Lamont Symphony (Colorado), Johannesburg Philharmonic Orchestra, Cape Town Philharmonic Orchestra, Sanremo Symphony Orchestra, Johannesburg Festival Orchestra, Orchestra del Teatro Traetta, and Unisa Symphony Orchestra.









ABOUT US

DURING THE LATTER PART OF 2021, THE MZANSI NATIONAL PHILHARMONIC ORCHESTRA (MZANSI PHILHARMONIC) WAS PROPERLY CONSTITUTED AS A NON-PROFIT COMPANY (SECTION 30) WITH A DISTINGUISHED BOARD OF DIRECTORS. IN JULY 2022, AFTER MANY MONTHS OF PREPARATION, THE ENGAGEMENT WITH NATIONAL AND INTERNATIONAL PARTNERS, AND THE ESTABLISHMENT OF THE NECESSARY BUSINESS PLANS AND PROTOCOLS, SOUTH AFRICA'S FIRST NATIONAL ORCHESTRA IN THE DEMOCRATIC ERA WAS OFFICIALLY LAUNCHED BY THE DEPARTMENT OF SPORT, ARTS AND CULTURE.

As articulated in the Revised White Paper, which was approved by cabinet in August 2018 and endorsed by parliament in February 2020, "harnessing the arts, culture and heritage for creative expression, education and training, job creation, and the eradication of poverty through close cooperation with all the levels of government and related departments, as well as the international community, is an essential aspect of the transformational process. Moving into the future, we are resolved to ensure that the arts, culture and heritage contributes to change and the creation of a better life for all."

To meet these objectives, the Mzansi National Philharmonic Orchestra has been established. The Mzansi Philharmonic is comprised of the cream of South African musicians who have earned a reputation for excellence and innovation in their fields.

The board of directors is led by Justice Leona Theron of the Constitutional Court of South Africa and consists of highly accomplished leaders: Ms Wendy Luhabe, Prof. Muxe Nkondo, and Mr Bongani Tembe.

The Mzansi Philharmonic is funded through a public/private partnership, which includes an annual grant from the National Department of Sport, Arts and Culture (DSAC), administered through the National Arts Council of South Africa. The Mzansi Philharmonic also collaborates with national and international partners to achieve its mandate.

The Mzansi Philharmonic is managed by Bongani Tembe, a Juilliard School graduate, who returned to



South Africa in 1994 at the dawn of South Africa's democracy. Mr Tembe is also the Chief Executive and Artistic Director of the KwaZulu-Natal and Johannesburg Philharmonic Orchestras.

A strong vision of high artistic values combined with fostering an understanding and cooperation between existing stakeholders in both the established and emerging classical music community, nationally, places the Mzansi Philharmonic on the leading edge of South Africa's performing arts institutions in an unprecedented fashion.

This year, the Mzansi National Philharmonic Orchestra has already performed in a variety of prestigious concerts.

July saw our official launch, as part of the WITS Centenary Celebrations in a concert curated by South African artist William Kentridge, featuring his most recent work: "Oh to Believe in Another World", which was accompanied by the Mzansi Philharmonic playing Shostakovich Symphony No. 10, conducted by Joseph Young.

In August, the Orchestra collaborated with the Turquoise Harmony Institute (THI) at a performance in Johannesburg, aimed at highlighting the plight of asylum seekers and refugees, who are among the world's most disenfranchised people. Under the baton of one of Mzansi Philharmonic's associate conductors, Kutlwano Masote, the Orchestra accompanied some of South Africa's finest artists. And lastly, this December, one of South Africa's fledgling orchestras, the Mpumalanga Chamber Orchestra (MPCO), has partnered with the Mzansi Philharmonic to celebrate opera in the province. Selected young singers from different parts of the Mpumalanga, under the umbrella of the Mpumalanga Opera Community, will showcase their singing skills accompanied by members MPCO and the Mzansi Philharmonic. On-stage orchestral mentorship and skills transfer is indeed a key pillar of the Mzansi Philharmonic's commitment to supporting the regional orchestras of South Africa.

MZANSI PHILHARMONIC COLLABORATES WITH TOP SA ARTISTS TO HIGHLIGHT THE PLIGHT OF REFUGEES 18TH AUGUST 2022

LINDER AUDITORIUM, JOHANNESBURG

The Mzansi National Philharmonic Orchestra (Mzansi Philharmonic) was proud to partner with the Turquoise Harmony Institute (THI) at a recent performance in Johannesburg, aimed at highlighting the plight of asylum seekers and refugees, who are among the world's most disenfranchised people. The intention was to reframe the refugee experience, shifting the debate away from refugee statistics and refocusing on the attitudes of those who may not be sure who refugees even are, creating connections through common experiences and increased understanding.

Under the baton of one of Mzansi Philharmonic's associate conductors, Kutlwano Masote, the Orchestra accompanied some of South Africa's finest artists. This stellar line-up featured PJ Powers, Msaki, Thandi Ntuli, Neill Solomon, Rock Steady Dub, Lebo Mashile, Bienvenue Nseka, Pops Mohamed, and Sipho "Hotstix" Mabuse. The Mzansi Philharmonic demonstrated that an orchestra can be at the base of an idea that represents good neighbourliness, tolerance, togetherness, and beauty when we come together.

Other partner organisations that contributed to making this concert possible include: Nelson Mandela Foundation, Amnesty International, Department of Sport, Arts and Culture, Universal Rights Association, Wits University, Flame Studios, Horizon Educational Trust, Mail and Guardian, Time to Care, Scalabrini Centre, IT Communication, Music in Africa, SAMRO, Concerts SA, and Refugee Social Services. All monies raised from this concert will be used to help refugees in South Africa through respected charities such as Gift of the Givers, Three to Six schools, and various other programs at the Turquoise Harmony Institute.

Selected young singers from different parts of the province, under the umbrella of the Mpumalanga Opera Community, showcased their singing skills accompanied by members MPCO and the Mzansi Philharmonic at the Mpumalanga Cultural Xperience, a weekend-long festivity under international Xperience pillar of the provincial government. This operatic celebration took place on Saturday, 10th December, in Nelspruit.

Leading up to the event, Zweli Mdakane, CEO of the MPCO, expressed his delight at hosting members of the Mzansi Philharmonic to bolster the Mpumalanga orchestra. "For our few musicians it will be a day to remember. A MAIDEN VOYAGE



To fully articulate the implications of this tour seems almost impossible. From the outset, the positivity, energy, passion, anticipation and commitment from each one of our stakeholders was palpable, and coursed through our team with unprecedented drive. Something about this endeavour struck differently to anything any of us had undertaken before, and the pledge to see it come to fruition was the kind of fulfilling work that leaves one completely empty, and, simultaneously, completely full.

The story of the Mzansi Philharmonic is richly layered with individual meaningful accounts of people being changed and impacted by the transformative power of the arts, and of music in particular. This has ceased to be an ethereal concept, moving into actuality and taking up definitive place amongst us. To make something like this happen, on this scale and with this kind of impact, takes a certain energy and sacrifice — the willingness to bring our full artistic selves into the arena with others, being willing to have our ideas used and shared or denied and abandoned, all without selfishness or pomp, and living out our learning of what true humility means, sometimes with tears and other times with gladness. Is this not more of what modern humanity truly needs?

The tour saw the cream of South African musicians in a homecoming tour, bringing together individuals from around the country and abroad, under the baton of Marin Alsop in an adapted performance of Beethoven's Symphony No. 9. In keeping with the Orchestra's value of creating resonance with ever wider audiences, the Mzansi Philharmonic joined Maestro Alsop's Global Ode to Joy project, reimagining Beethoven's 9th Symphony for the 21st Century. Standing with Beethoven in his representation of the universality of humankind, the South African version saw the weaving in of Zulu text through portions of the work. In addition, Grammy award-winning artist Wouter Kellerman worked closely with Marin Alsop to create a single movement work, which featured a prelude and movement interludes performed on flute with an indigenous instrument ensemble. Added to this were the voices of local choirs, resident in each city. The result was a performance of this Symphony as has never been heard

before, and the artistic excellence with which it was undertaken left a lasting impression on audiences.

In an attempt to feature the full extent of the tour's impact, we created avenues for additional artistic expression. Firstly, we contracted Emmy award-winning filmmaker François Verster to create both a concert film and behind-thescenes documentary of the tour. These will be released later in the year. There are current negotiations to broadcast these films on national, and possibly international, television. (As an aside, an American film producer also joined the tour to research the possibility of further projects that tell the Mzansi Philharmonic's story, specifically as it relates to Marin Alsop.)

In addition, the Orchestra hired graphic artist Duncan Stewart, who travelled with the Mzansi Philharmonic, creating artworks along the way. Some of these works have been gifted to stakeholders, while others represent the story of the tour and will be assembled into an appropriate exhibition format.

The overwhelming sense of realised hope was seen as audiences flocked into sold out venues throughout the country. Here, in our beautiful South Africa — richly woven with heartache, pain, loss, joy, triumph we saw people of every age, race, gender, and socioeconomic standing marvel, many of them overwhelmed to the point of tears, at the experience of beauty and artistic excellence that both identified with them and still surpassed their expectations of the norm. And all this at a time when many of them needed it most.

Herein lies the magic of it all: our inaugural national four was the incarnation of artistic ideals that, for many, until now, has been held in concept only.

FRANCOIS VERSTER

Francois Verster is one of South Africa's most celebrated filmmakers. His documentaries are acclaimed for their intimacy, social insight and formal innovation, and have consistently garnered local and international awards, including an Emmy for Outstanding Artistic and Cultural Programming and a World Press Photo Online Video award. They have shown at major global festivals and galleries such as IDFA, Toronto IFF, Hot Docs, Visions du Reel, AFI, MOMA New York, the Jeu de Paume Paris, and the Sydney FF.

MANEM

Critically acclaimed titles include THE DREAM OF SHAHRAZAD (2014), SEA POINT DAYS (2009), THE MOTHERS' HOUSE (2006), A LION'S TRAIL (2002), and WHEN THE WAR IS OVER (2002). He produced, filmed and edited Shameela Seedat's films WHISPERING TRUTH TO POWER (2018, winner of the Special Jury prize at Hot Docs, the 2019 African Studies Association Film Award, a Bronze Stallion at FESPACO, and various other awards), as well as her follow-up film AFRICAN MOOT (2022). He co-directed the Emmy-nominated SCENES FROM A DRY CITY (2018), as well as GIRL, TAKEN (2022), currently screening on Paramount Plus.

Verster has taught documentary classes or held fellowships at Columbia University, New York, University of Cape Town, University of the Witwatersrand and elsewhere, and has published on documentary in various journals and anthologies. He currently convenes a think tank on creative documentary at the University of the Western Cape. He has appeared on various festival juries and has had ten festival retrospectives or special focus series on his work, most recently at Indiana University, Bloomington.

DUNCAN STEWART




COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT PAYLESS SHELTER PAYHOUSE OPERA, DURBAN 17TH DECEMBER 2022

Marin Alsop opened the evening, following which Conductors who had participated in the Conductors Workshop (which took place at the start of the tour) were afforded the opportunity to lead the Orchestra.





OVERVIEW

THE MZANSI NATIONAL PHILHARMONIC ORCHESTRA HAS IMPLEMENTED A NATIONAL CADETSHIP PROGRAMME IN RECOGNITION OF THE LIMITED REPRESENTATION OF BLACK MUSICIANS AND INCREASING DEMAND FOR SOUTH AFRICAN MUSICIANS IN THE POOL OF PRESENT AND FUTURE PROFESSIONAL MUSICIANS IN SOUTH AFRICAN ORCHESTRAS.

The Mzansi Philharmonic will play an active role in harnessing South African musicians and providing them with the opportunity to acquire the essential skills and experience for a successful career in the performing arts, specifically in the orchestral industry. The programme contributes to job creation by offering targeted training and development that will lead to gainful employment of many musicians.

The programme, which was initiated and developed during the 1990s by Bongani Tembe and implemented by the KZN Philharmonic Orchestra, was the first of its kind in Africa. The Cadetship Programme is specifically designed to harness promising orchestra players. It is open to all South Africans, particularly those from historically disadvantaged communities, who are of a suitable playing standard and whose aim is to become professional orchestral musicians.

Mzansi Philharmonic has, in 2022, assumed custodianship of this programme and is excited to roll out nationally.

THE NATIONAL CADETSHIP PROGRAMME OFFERS PARTICIPANTS THE OPPORTUNITY TO:

- work directly with professional musicians, learn from their experience and establish how playing skills can be applied to the orchestral repertoire through hands-on activities and specific playing opportunities;
 - increase their knowledge and understanding of the practical details and processes involved in playing in a professional orchestra;
 - receive lessons in a one-to-one format, from orchestra musicians, which are funded by the programme.

SUCCESSFUL CANDIDATES WILL RECEIVE:

- weekly lessons, which are funded by Mzansi Philharmonic, from principal members of the three regional professional orchestras;
 - weekly studio classes led by members of the three regional orchestras — KZN Philharmonic, Joburg Philharmonic and the Cape Town Philharmonic and guest artists;

- weekly classes in music theory and ear training through partnership with music schools and universities;
- a chance to perform in rehearsals and concerts with the regional orchestras and the Mzansi Philharmonic;
- other performance opportunities;
- free tuition for performance and theory examinations through UNISA;
- access to the facilities at a partner Music School (from each of the respective regional orchestras) for practicing and chamber music.

The programme is open to all South Africans (although historically disadvantaged individuals will receive first option). Applicants must demonstrate a much better than average aptitude on their principal instrument as well as a strong interest in playing in a professional orchestra, and a background of involvement in music-related activities. They should be either entering their junior or senior year of undergraduate study, recent university graduates or pursuing graduate level studies, achieving a minimum overall passing rate of 70%. (Candidates who are not enrolled in institutions of higher learning will be considered under exceptional circumstances.)

Financial allocation to cadets, depending on their level and circumstances, may include the following: Payment for tuition, group coaching, and stipends of up to R12,500 per month, and, in some cases, payment of university fees.

One of the strengths of the programme is its dual mentorship component. Several times per week, the cadet works with an orchestra member to whom she or he has been assigned. The cadets therefore learn directly from one of the field's top professionals. The Artistic Director and/or Orchestra Manager of the Mzansi Philharmonic and the respective orchestra, who serves as an "external" mentor to the cadet, perform the other mentorship.

At the conclusion of each academic year, all the relevant stakeholders will monitor and evaluate the learning experience and the cadetship programme as a whole. The cadets themselves are also evaluated and given the opportunity to audition for positions in professional orchestras. Cadets are also encouraged to audition for other South African orchestras.

In addition to the many benefits outlined above, the performing arts in general also benefits. The continued success of orchestral music in our country is dependent on both funding and patronage. The programme provides opportunities to ensure the accessibility of the music to young and diverse audiences, and, by the same token, attract the interests of donors wishing to establish themselves in these markets.

In a culturally diverse country like South Africa, broadening the appeal of orchestral music also requires the performance of music that the public can relate to and identify with. The Mzansi Philharmonic will provide the means to achieve this, with tangible results.

A significant part of the budget will be allocated to sustain this unique developmental programme, which leads to job creation.

She is currently studying for her Bachelor of Music Degree, which she hopes to complete in 2023.









FINANCIAL OVERVIEW

THE ASTUTE MANAGEMENT OF FINANCES IS CENTRAL
TO THE MZANSI NATIONAL PHILHARMONIC
ORCHESTRA'S COMPANY VALUES. ACTING AS A
RESOURCE TO SOCIETY IN GENERAL, AS WELL AS
PARTLY FUNDING REGIONAL ORCHESTRAS AND
VARIOUS SMALLER ENTITIES, THE MZANSI
PHILHARMONIC TAKES SERIOUSLY ITS
RESPONSIBILITY TO STEWARD ASSETS WELL.

The Mzansi Philharmonic remains committed to elevating the cultural scene within South Africa, demonstrating its versatility as an asset to all sectors of society.

The Orchestra receives an annual grant of about R21.5 million from the Department of Sport, Arts and Culture, via the National Arts Council. R54 million, accumulated over a number of years, was allocated to the Orchestra with the first installment of R41 million received in December 2021.

Mzansi Philharmonic is also in the process of establishing an endowment fund for the sustainability of the Orchestra.


Viewing the arts through the lens of social integration means understanding its value and the contribution it makes.

A number of partnerships in this vein have already been established, with local, regional, national and international relationships being incepted.
