## PART A: EXECUTIVE SUMMARY





#### **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

- DWS continues to implement measures to accelerate key service delivery programmes.
- For the third quarter the Department's performance targets achievement is 71% with 61% of the budget spent.
- A number of factors led to poor productivity on construction projects including, amongst others; inadequate planning and work scheduling, lack of collaboration and communication between stakeholders on projects, as well as inadequate capacity of Water Boards and Municipalities.
- The DWS is implementing various interventions to improve project implementation including:
  - Infrastructure Procurement Strategy
  - Improved project management processes
- Turnaround and Financial Recovery Plan is being implemented to deal with historic challenges of the department.
- Continuous improvement initiatives aimed at acceleration of service delivery and strategic support of municipalities are also ongoing.
- Significant progress has been made to stabilise the department, including in relation to collaborating with law enforcement agencies which has resulted in recovery of funds from previous years' irregularities by the Special Investigating Unit.

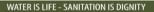

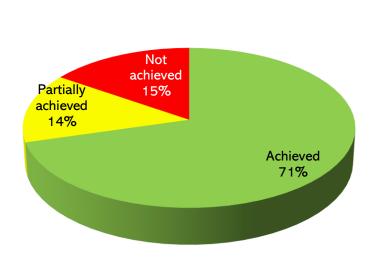

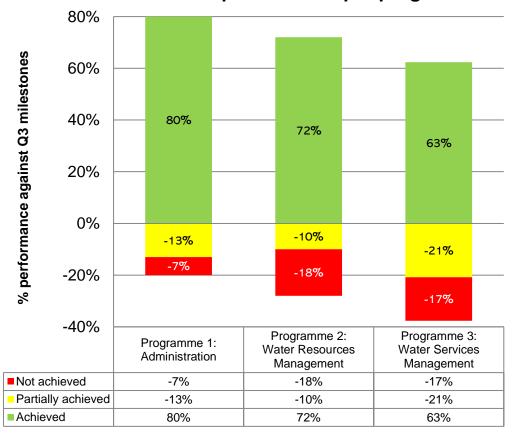

#### Consolidated performance per programme



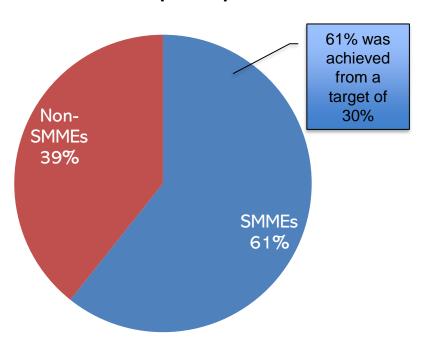
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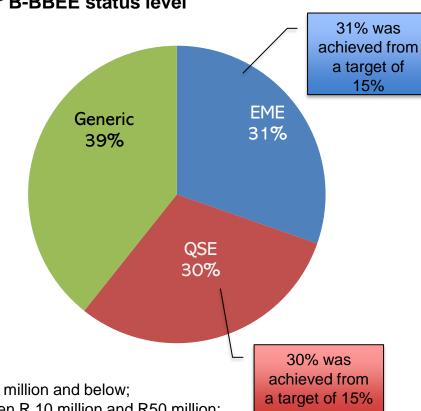

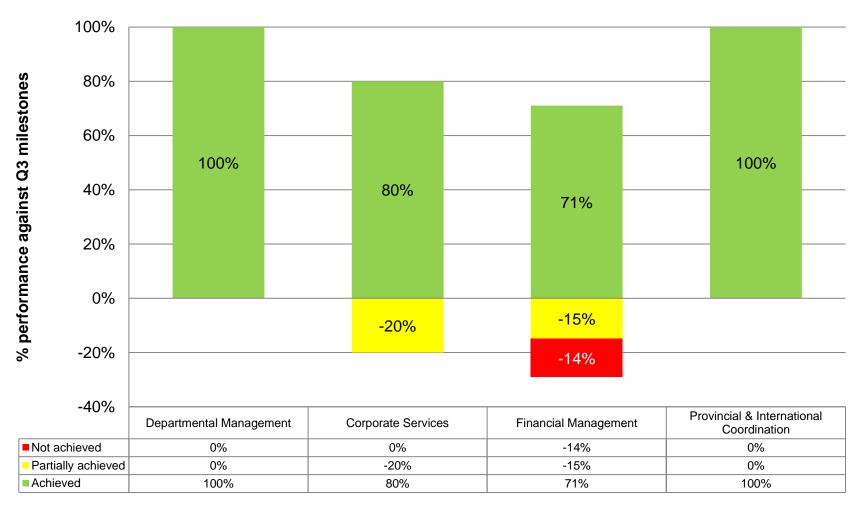

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## PART C: OVERVIEW OF FINANCIAL PERFORMANCE





#### **QUARTER 3 OVERVIEW EXPENDITURE**

- The department's expenditure for the period ended 31 December 2022 amounted to **R11.399** billion, representing sixty-one per cent (61%) of the total adjusted appropriation of **R18.555** billion, leaving total unspent funds of **R7.155** billion.
- For the same reporting period in the 2021/22 financial year, cumulative spending was fifty-five per cent (55%), this represent a comparative increase of six percent (6%).
- When compared to the approved drawings to date of **R13.393 billion**, the department reflected an under-expenditure of **R1.993 billion** or eleven per cent (11%). Cumulative variations from projected spending within various economic classifications are as follows:
  - Compensation of employees is below approved drawings by R21.104 million, this is due to reduced rate of filling vacancies to comply with mandatory budget cuts over the Medium-Term Expenditure Framework period. Only critical prioritised posts are being filled.
  - Goods and services is below approved drawings by R164.018 million this is mainly due to unpaid invoices for KwaZulu-Natal disaster interventions which have been returned to the Service Provider for correction and other operational expenditure such as Office Rentals
  - Transfers and subsidies are below drawings by R349.847 million due to deferred local government conditional grants (Noncompliance with the Division of Revenue Act), and Water Boards transfer payments which were rescheduled for payment in the third quarter.
  - Payments for capital assets is below drawings by R1.458 billion, the significant contributor is
    the indirect grant allocation to Municipalities which include both the regional bulk and water
    services infrastructure grants, detailed analysis with corrective measures is included in the
    subsequent slides.

#### STRENGTHENING CREDIT CONTROL IN THE WATER SECTOR

- DWS and the water boards are putting in place the following measures to strengthen billing and revenue collection by DWS and the Water Boards:
  - DWS will collaborate with National Treasury to ensure that equitable share allocations are withheld from non-paying municipalities.
  - DWS will ensure that standardised credit control and debt recovery processes will be put in place across all the water boards. This will include consistent enforcement of water limitations/restrictions on non-paying municipalities and legal processes to attach municipal bank accounts where necessary.
  - Bulk prepaid meters will be installed by water boards in municipalities with a poor payment record.
  - The Minister is in the process of consulting with Mayors about the measures to be taken before implementation





#### INDIRECT GRANTS INFRASTRUCTURE EXPENDITURE

- The adjusted 2022/23 financial year allocations-in-kind to municipalities amounts to R3.471 billion for the Regional Bulk Infrastructure Grant and R771.336 million for the Water Services Infrastructure Grant. The overall spending is 47% and 49% respectively up to December 2023.
- Based on the latest projections for the fourth quarter, it is estimated that the Bulk Infrastructure Grant allocation will underspend the budget by R416.580 million. The provinces contributing to this underspending are Eastern Cape, Free State, Gauteng, Limpopo, Northern Cape, Western Cape and the Bucket Eradication Programme.
- There is projected under expenditure within the Disaster Response allocations for Eastern Cape and KwaZulu-Natal provinces due to late appointment of Services Providers (Eastern Cape: Amatola Water) and outstanding supporting documents from the Service Provider (KwaZulu-Natal).
- However, management has implemented a range of measures to minimize under-expenditure and will focus on these over the next quarter.
- Some of the provinces recorded expenditure in line with the projections, however, others recorded low expenditure due to the following reasons:
  - Termination of Contractors due to poor performance.
  - Delay in the submission of invoices by the Implementing Agents, and delays in payment to the service providers.
  - Work stoppages, contractual disputes and community protests.
  - Project implementation delayed due to non-responsiveness of bids.
  - Bucket Eradication Programme slow moving projects due to, inter alia, contractual disputes, changes to the designs mid-construction.
  - Instabilities within municipalities affecting the effective implementation of projects.

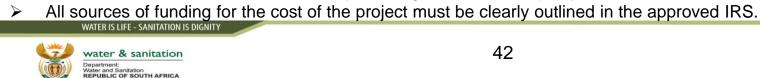

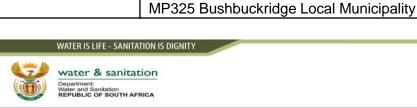

### **MEASURES TO PREVENT UNDERSPENDING (1)**

- As part of the measures to prevent underspending the Department has reprioritised budgets between projects with supporting acceleration plans. Acceleration Plans are being implemented, key projects with capacity to absorb additional funds include amongst others, Thembisile Water Scheme (Loskop), Madibeng Bulk Water Supply, Giyani Water Reticulation Project and Extension of the George water treatment capacity.
- Resultant from these interventions being implemented by the Department, there has been a significant improvement from the midterm expenditure to the year-to-date expenditure. The Department has registered commitments amounting to over **R7.308 billion** and Provincial Offices are currently working with Water Boards and Municipalities to resolve project bottlenecks.
- Based on the current projections and delayed projects it is estimated that the regional bulk infrastructure grant
  will underspend by a total amount of R416.580 million. The Department has submitted the following request
  to National Treasury as part of measures to mitigate underspending and improve service delivery:

#### Giyani Water Reticulation and Household Connection Project: R282.332 million

Reallocation of an amount of R282.332 million from the Regional Bulk Infrastructure Grant 6B allocation to Water Services Infrastructure Grant 6B allocation to support current initiatives for the reticulation of water to the affected villages. Mopani Municipality has accelerated appointment of service providers for phase 1 villages.

#### o George Potable Water Security and Remedial Works Project: R134.248 million

Reallocation of an amount of R134.248 million from the Regional Bulk Infrastructure Grant 6B allocation to Regional Bulk Infrastructure Grant 5B allocation. George Municipality has expedited various components of the projects. The current potable water treatment constraints have also necessitated that the extension of the water treatment capacity by an additional 20MI/day, be expedited to ensure security of potable water supply.

• The Department will continue to focus on interventions aimed at minimizing under-expenditure for the remaining months of the financial year.





### **MEASURES TO PREVENT UNDERSPENDING (2)**

The Department is also moving funds to the following projects which have the capacity to absorb additional funding:

#### a) Madibeng Bulk Water Supply

Magalies Water has been appointed as the implementing agent for the completion of the upgrade of the Brits plant from 60 ml/d to 80 ml/d. The overall civil works is currently at the advanced stage for completion with the mechanical and electrical commencing with their equipment and materials installations.

#### b) Loskop Regional Bulk Water Supply Scheme

Loskop Regional Bulk Water Supply Scheme Progress-Cross Boundary Scheme Mpumalanga and Limpopo. 3 out of 5 work packages awarded and established site (WP1,2&3). WP1 has obtained work permit from Department of Labour and have commenced with clearing and pegging. Pipe have been material ordered. Work permit has been obtained for and pegging of the pipe route done.

#### c) Giyani Water Reticulation and Household Connection Project

Mopani District Municipality is accelerating implementation of reticulation, storage, and yard connections phase 1 (24 villages of the 55 villages) project which encompasses refurbishment of existing reticulation and storage and installation of new reticulation, storage, and yard connections including mechanical and electrical works at Giyani Water Treatment Works.

#### d) George Potable Water Security and Remedial Works Project

The Municipality has expedited various components of the Budget Facility for Infrastructure projects. The current potable water treatment constraints have also necessitated that the extension of the water treatment capacity by an additional 20Ml/day, be expedited to ensure security of potable water supply.

### OVERVIEW OF UNAUTHORISED, IRREGULAR, FRUITLESS AND WASTEFUL EXPENDITURE

- The Department is in constant communication with National Treasury on outstanding condonation applications.
- The total Unauthorised Expenditure for an amount of R641.109 million has been submitted to National Treasury for condonation. Await Parliamentary approval.
- Irregular Expenditure to an amount of R138.732 million has been submitted to National Treasury for condonation and currently being assessed.
- Irregular Expenditure to an amount of R8.299 billion has been referred back to the Department by National Treasury for finalisation of disciplinary processes, South African Police Service and Special Investigating Unit investigations and court proceedings etc.
- Irregular Expenditure to an amount of R2.036 billion is under investigation.
- Irregular Expenditure to an amount of R5.736 billion is under assessment including collation of supporting documents thereafter these will be referred for investigation.
- Irregular Expenditure to an amount of R433.227 million have been condoned by the Director-General in line with the response from National Treasury. These includes concluded SAP licences investigations and other cases of non-compliance with internal policies.
- Increases on Fruitless and Wasteful expenditure: On the Main Account these relate to Fraudulent S&T claims and on the Water Trading Entity these relates to losses incurred on external projects and internal projects implemented by the Construction Unit. Investigation of these costs in progress.
- The Department continues to make follow-ups on irregular expenditure referred to the South African Police Service and Special Investigating Unit.

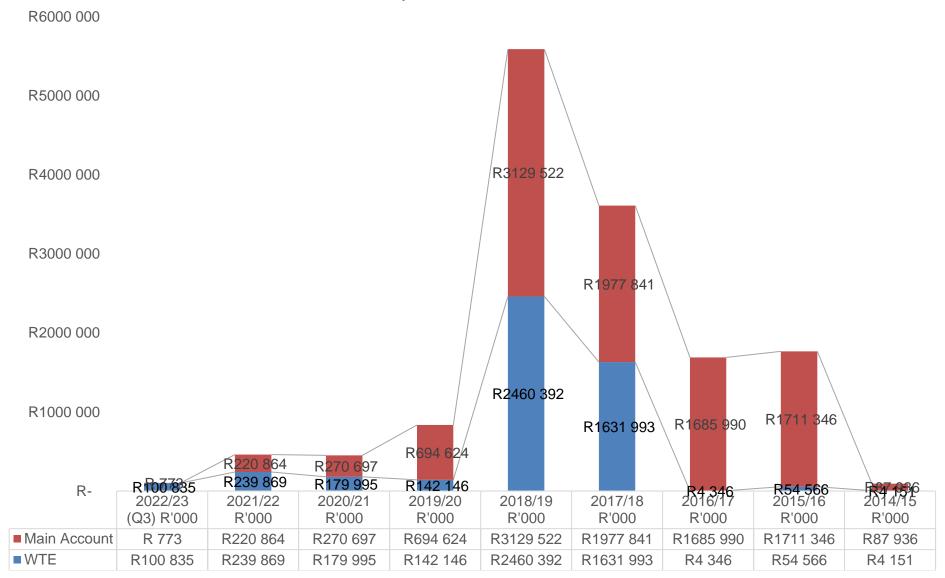

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#### IRREGULAR EXPENDITURE TRANSGRESSIONS

- Analysis of all the irregular expenditure cases incurred in the prior years and the nature of transgressions revealed the following control deficiencies within the procurement processes:
  - Bid evaluation not done in accordance with the advertised evaluation criteria.
  - Change of scope of work after bid awarded without approval by the delegated official.
  - Competitive bidding process not followed: deviations for emergency procurement not supported or approved by National Treasury.
  - Competitive bidding process not followed: Service providers appointed as sole suppliers without supporting proof.
  - Competitive bidding process not followed: Services providers handpicked, specific individual selected and recommended to serve at Departmental Bid Adjudication Committee.
  - Contracts extended without prior approval by the delegated official(s).
  - Contract signed by an unauthorised official and without legal vetting.
  - Expenditure in excess of contract amount.
  - Declarations not made by company directors employed by the state.
  - Procurement above R500 000 not done through competitive bidding.
  - Appointment of services providers not on the panel of preferred suppliers.
  - Service providers appointed without meeting the Departmental Bid Adjudication Committee quorum requirements.
  - Service providers appointed without signed valid contracts.
  - Services rendered after contract expired without approval by the delegated official(s).
  - SITA legislation requirement not complied with when advertising bids (for example, IT services not procured through SITA).





### **IRREGULAR EXPENDITURE TRANSGRESSIONS (CONTINUED)**

- Tenders advertised for a shorter period without National Treasury approval and tenders not advertised publicly.
- Variation order exceeding the threshold and not approved by National Treasury.
- Supply Chain Management Policies and Standard Operating Procedures have been updated and communicated to staff with continuous monitoring and support of implementation processes.
- The Department has put in place various preventative measures to ensure that incidents of improper expenditure do not recur and all outstanding cases of unauthorised, irregular, fruitless and wasteful expenditure are being fast tracked for finalisation in the 2023/24 financial year as per the Department's commitment made to the Standing Committee on Public Accounts.



### **CONCLUSION**

- The Department is implementing a turnaround and financial recovery plan which incorporates stabilisation of the Department (Leadership, ethics and organisational culture, staff training and development), improvement of systems of internal controls, preventative measures against unauthorised, irregular, fruitless and wasteful expenditure.
- Trend analysis of improper expenditure is reflecting a decline in incidents of irregular, fruitless and wasteful expenditure.
- There are no new incidents of unauthorised expenditure.
- Measures taken to eliminate irregular, fruitless and wasteful expenditure. Supported by preventative controls measures.
- An exit strategy on irregular contracts is also being implemented to ensure that the current incidents of irregular expenditure resulting from prior periods contract are terminated.
- Progress has been made on disciplinary and investigation matters including continued engagement with various law enforcement agencies.
- The Department is collaborating with the SIU for all the SIU investigations into the old unauthorized and irregular expenditure. In some cases this has resulted in the Department recovering substantial amounts of money, e.g., R413.121 million recovered from the SAP contract. EOH has agreed to pay back R191.883 million, inclusive of interest, over a period of 36 months.
- The streamlined and integrated water sector value chain support and interventions measures by the Department are also part of service delivery improvement plans.

The project is on hold due to delays by Amatola water (IA). The final notice of termination dated 02/12/2022 was issued to AW and Ndlambe LM has
been appointed as the new IA to complete the project and a letter of appointment dated 19/10/2022 was issued to Ndlambe LM.
Handover meeting was held on 12 December 2022; however, it could not be finalised as the hand over report needs to be revised due to an incident
of vandalism that occurred at the Port Alfred BWRO in November 2022. The PSP has to take stock of what is left there in terms of the equipment
materials.
There are no contractors on the project except the PSP that was appointed by Amatola Water and security contracts. The contractors are either
terminated or completed their scope of works. Ndlambe LM is to procure for the appointment of a new contractor to complete the remaining scope
of works. Ndlambe LM to decide on whether they would take over the PSP through SCM deviation process.
❖ The remaining budget on the approved project cost is about R50 million.
The overall estimate to complete the project is about R93,7 million, therefore, the project requires additional funding of R44million, subject to
change as a result of vanadlism.
The project will be implemented beyond March 2023 since its still going out to tender for the contractor procurement and Ndlambe LM is to submit
the PIP including procurement plan.
The current project phase which is under construction is at 55% progress however the overall project progress is at 93%.
❖ The Contractor suspended the works due to non-payment of invoices because of ADM workers strike.
❖ The contractor is back on site and submitted acceleration plan
❖ The outstanding civil works completion is anticipated in June 2023.
