Securing borders, charging companies employing illegal immigrants, and ending load shedding are immediate priorities.

Madam Speaker, Regulating the digital industry and transforming the film and television sector to promote educational content are imperative. An aggressive local manufacturing drive is needed to transform the township economy and restore citizens' economic activity.

Madam Speaker, prioritising Skills development centres, libraries, and arts centres over taverns in townships is vital for combating social ills.

Access to healthcare, a basic human right, requires employing unemployed doctors and initiating a farming revolution for food security.
