Section 23 (1) (d) of the National Conventional Arms Control Act, (Act 41 of 2002) provides that the National Conventional Arms Control Committee (NCACC) must make quarterly reports to the Cabinet and a committee of Parliament determined by Parliament on all conventional arms exports conducted during the preceding quarter. In accordance with the legislative requirement cited above, the NCACC wishes to present this 2011 Fourth Quarterly Report to the National Assembly.

This 2011 Fourth Quarterly Report provides information on conventional arms exports conducted by South Africa over the period July to September 2011. The Quarterly Report presents this information in a manner consistent with the provisions of the National Conventional Arms Control Act (Act 41 of 2002). To that end, the following categories of information are covered by the report:

 Names of importing countries (countries where conventional arms were exported to).

- Types of conventional arms exported.
- Rand value of the exports.
- Reasons for temporary transfers.

NCACC'S LEGISLATIVE FRAMEWORK AND MANDATE

The National Conventional Arms Control Committee (NCACC) is a Committee established in terms of law to regulate the conventional arms sector in South Africa. Section 3 of the National Conventional Arms Control Act (Act 41 of 2002) provides for the object and mandate of the NCACC. Section 4 of this Act provides for the functions of the NCACC. These could be summarized as the regulation of development, manufacturing and transfer of conventional arms in South Africa. The regulations to the National Conventional Arms Control Act (Act 41 of 2002) dated 28 May 2004 provides details on how the regulation of the conventional arms sector is conducted in South Africa.

Section 5 of the National Conventional Arms Control Act (Act 41 of 2002) provides for the membership of the NCACC. Members of the NCACC are Cabinet Ministers and Deputy Ministers specifically appointed by the President. The positions of the Chairpersons of the NCACC are held by Cabinet Ministers who do not have line function interests in the conventional arms business. This has been done for purposes of ensuring the NCACC's objectivity in the conduct of its business.

In order to provide for secretariat and administrative support to the NCACC, Section 8 of the National Conventional Arms Control Act (Act 41 of 2002) provides for the establishment of the Directorate Conventional Arms Control (DCAC). This Directorate is located within the Department of Defence (Defence Secretariat). This Directorate has a specific function as provided for in the Act. Briefly, this function is to provide for an administrative mechanism to prepare documentation for the NCACC and to serve as the line of communication between the NCACC, the Defence Industry and all other relevant stakeholders. This Directorate also ensures the execution of the NCACC's decisions and policies.

As a further support structure to the NCACC Section 9 of the National Conventional Arms Control Act, (Act 41 of 2002) establishes the Inspectorate. The purpose of the Inspectorate is to ensure that trade in conventional arms is conducted in compliance with the provisions of the Act. The Inspectorate also ensures that the internal regulatory processes of the Committee are complied with.

The NCACC has ensured that all the necessary institutional mechanism and structures prescribed by the Act to support the efficient regulation of conventional arms are in place. The NCACC is supported by other government departments and agencies. These include the Department of International Relations & Cooperation, Department of Defence, Department of Trade and Industry. National Intelligence Agency, South African Secret Service and the South African Police Service. Over and above these, the NCACC can be assisted by any other relevant institutions of government as and when required.

LEGISLATIVE DEVELOPMENTS

The NCACC administers both the National Conventional Arms Control Act (Act 41 of 2002) and the Prohibition of Mercenary Activities and the Regulations of Certain Activities in a Country of Armed Conflict Act (Act 27 of 2006). This Act is not in operation yet pending the approval of its Regulations.

The National Conventional Arms Control Amendment Act was assented to by the President in April 2009. The process to draft the Regulations to the Act has been finalised during the period under review. Once the Regulations have been promulgated the National Conventional Arms Control Amendment Act will come into operation.

PERMIT APPLICATIONS

As its primary function, the NCACC considers the defence industry's permit applications and issues or denies such permits. In executing this important function, the NCACC considers all relevant factors as stipulated in Section 15 of the National Conventional Arms Control Act (Act 41 of 2002). The NCACC considers each and every permit application submitted on the basis of its own merits in line with the case-by-case principle as contemplated in the Act.

In the period under review, the NCACC considered and approved the following categories and numbers of permit applications:

- Registration Permit Applications, 37.
- Marketing Permit Applications, 6.
- Contracting Permit Applications, 82.
- Export Permit Applications, 1,016.
- Import Permit Applications, 746.
- Conveyance, 10.

For the same period, the NCACC considered and denied 1 Contracting Permit Applications.

Details on these applications in terms of approvals, countries, values and categories of equipment involved are contained in Appendix A, B and C of this report.

COMPLIANCE AND VERIFICATION MATTERS


CONCLUSION
