### My Submission

I would like to firstly, present a perspective on E-tolling as an additional tax burden on an already overburdened and unrepresentative tax payer.

The essence of democracy over-the last 300 odd years has been "no taxation without representation" I want to suggest that the racial and racist divides in our political and electoral system has effectively turned those not classified as African into tax payers without representation and the franchise (as opposed to the vote).

At 30c per km toll, petrol costs of a minimum of R1 per km and excluding wear and tear on my old car, a visit will cost me close to R200. My pension is R5500 per month of which about R1000 is left over for food and entertainment - the latter an exaggerated term.

I will NOT buy an e-tag. It will be much cheaper to be arrested and go to goal. I have nothing of material value that can be repossessed. At least I will have TV and meat in goal.

Those who instituted e-tolling have lost the last ounce of morality that they might have had. They must take full responsibility for the devastating revolution that will be unleashed in our country. Greed is not good.
