- at this stage requires voluntary registration A third category of aerodrome is being developed which
- It is expected that registration would become compulsory industry, e.g. charter flights to/ from game farms commercial flights supporting, inter-alia, the hospitality at least in respect of aerodromes used for non-scheduled

Background cont.

- Many private aerodromes exist which are often recreational flying - often referred to as 'airstrips' only used for agriculture, e.g. crop-spraying, or
- No requirements currently exist for compulsory space they are to be developed in areas of congested air licensing or registration of these 'airstrips', unless
