INTRODUCTION

 Our Office was requested to advise on the submission by Dr Johann Broodryk for constitutional review by the Joint Constitutional Review Committee.

2. From the submission provided, it is not clear what Dr Broodryk argues for. He notes that because Chapter 2 of the Constitution, 1996 deals with Ubuntu, it would be convenient for students to study the Bill of Rights in order to understand Ubuntu.

LEGAL ADVICE

3. This submission therefore does not propose an amendment to a particular constitutional provision. Dr Broodryk's submission should be directed at an appropriate parliamentary committee.

4. It is recommended that the Joint Constitutional Review Committee does not consider the submission for the purpose of an amendment to the Constitution.
